

ILL-TIMED DECISION.

For years the sportsmen at the St. Law rence have laboured in vain to prevent illegal net-fishing. They were actuated by two monameter protection, of the nubbe interests and the advancement of their personal in. terests. They have done a great deal of good. They have made the fishermen more respectful of law than they expected to do, and they have saved the fisheries from the destruction which certainly would have followed had the indiscriminate use of nets been al lowed.

Now, however, a change for the worse is promised and in consequence of a decision of Justice Williams of the supreme court. He held that the act which declared nets used to be contrary to law and public nuisances, and empowering state game and fish protectors to seize and destroy them, unconstitutional. The case on which the decision was arose in Jefferson county. The nets were seized and destroyed at Black River bay. The owners sued the fish protector, State Commissioner Sherman, and E. L. Sargent, president of the Jefferson county fish and game association, for the value of the property so summarily taken. The two last named were made defendants on the ground that they had instigated or encouraged the seizure. The trial resulted in the acquittal of Messrs. Sherman and Sargent, while a verdict for the plaintiffs was rendered in regards to the game constable. The defendant asked that the verdict be set aside, and the only day the justice, in refusing the request, declared the statute unconstitutional. The Jefferson county society is carrying the case to the higher courts, and until a final decision is reached, the fish protectors will not act against the netters.

It is a pity that the defects of the law now made manifest were not detected sooner in order that they might have been remedied at the meeting of the legislature now sitting in extra session. As it is the decision of Justice Williams has a serious import ; it is practically speaking, a notice to the fishermen to do as they like, to use the nets best suited to their purpose, to set them when and where they please, to catch as many fish as they please, to deplete the river of fish altogether if they feel so disposed. They were trying to do this even under lega restraint. It is not difficult to conceive what they will accomplish now that they are left without check and hindrance.

### PROTECTIONIST TALK.

The Toronto World has been displeased with the reports of bad crops in the district of Kingston, and by the references to the boon commercial reciprocity would afford to the now impoverished farmers. It criticizes the information embodied in a letter from Lennox county to the WHIG, and observes :

"On the whole we venture to believe that some of the famine reports published are instigated if not written by men who are hot partisians of commercial union-too hot to give anything like a fair and unbiassed account. And we cannot forget that the same crowd who are howling now for C.U., so that our farmers may import American grain cheap to feed their stock, were last year howling for the same thing in order that our farmers might sell to American buyers at the big prices current over the boarder. We also make this point : That the famine prophets have been talking much of the same thing which once was, rather than of the thing which now is, and that even while they have been talking the season has been greatly changing."

CURE FOR INEBRIETY.

Dr. Portugaloff, the Russian physician and publicist, declares that strychnine, ap. plied in subcutaneously, is an immediate and infallible remedy for drunkenness. The craving of the inebriate for drink, he says, is changed into positive aversion in a day, and after a treatment of eight or ten days the patient may be discharged. Even should the appetite return months afterwards the first attempt to resume drinking will pro. duce such painful and nauseating sensations that the person will turn away from the liquor in disgust. The strychnine is administered by dissolving one grain in 200 drops of water and injecting five drops of the solution every twenty-four hours.

The second secon enness under certain circumstances. Physical prostration will not turn some men away frem the liquor that is slowly killing them. They may suffer the tortures of the damned -and the victims of alcoholism endure far more than they are supposed to do-and yet thirst for the vilest of stimulants. The miserably fallen, who will consume rure alcohol and high wines when they cannot get whiskey, are not willing to be turned against liquor because their tastes are vitiated. Without the will power which moral reformation demands they abandon themselves to their fate. They are incapable of the one supreme effort upon which their salvation demands.

The experiences of the last week in this city show that nothing short of confinement and restraint will bring the drunkard into a condition of thoughtfulness. There should arrest as criminals, because they do not offend publicly, and still they were fit subjects for severe discipline. They are the care of the state that licenses a traffic that injures them, and unless general prohibition be an early realization it may be necessary to erect in every city and town a small asylum in which the helpless, aimless, reckless bibulist can be incarcerated, not for ten days or a month, as in the penal institutions, but as long as there are evidences of his inability to control himself.

Education on the temperance question is not bringing about the results so much desired. Education must, therefore, be assisted by treatment suggestive of physical as well as mental improvement.

#### EDITORIAL NOTES.

The New York banks are benefitting by Canada's financial mismanagement. The \$14,000,000 which Hon. Mr. Foster borrowed unnecessarily, for which he pays 31 per cent. interest and could not place in Canada at any rate, is loaned to the Americans at 11 per cent. What a fraternal and benevolent government we have, to be sure !

The Winnipeg Call demands "that the Manitoba legislature shall be called together to discuss the railway situation before the Greenway government shall have handed over the interests of the province to the tender mercies of the Northern Pacific." 
