THE IRISH GAOLS.

The death of Mr. Mandeville, M.P., in the Tullemore gaol, is the most unfortunate thing that could have happened at the present, or any time, so far as Mr. Balfour's administration of affairs in Ireland is concerned. He took advantage of the disturbed condition of life in the places where the national league was strong to connect it with the frequently reported infractions of the law, and by the Crimes act he sought (1) to check offences against the crown, and (2) that agitation, which, in a political relationship, was so annoying to the govern-

The Crimes act, for the enforcement of which Mr. Balfour pleaded so hard, practically placed the nationalists in his keeping. and, by rigorous prison discipline he has done what he could to tame them. It was not known until lately-and the admission leaked out then accidentally-that Mr. Balfour had assumed to dictate as to the manner in which the political prisoners be even terrorized into submission. Rough treatment is all very well in some cases, the prisoners being in robust health, but circumstances alter cases, and because they were not altered in the case of Mr. Mandeville he is no more. But though dead a vet speaketh, and with an effect he never could have made while in the flesh. He offended by continuing his agitation against government's methods, and he was cast into prison. He prison garb, and it is in evidence that Daniel Goulding, the governor of the gaol, entered the cell with six warders and, after a desperate struggle, stripped the prisoner naked and was about to leave him in that condition, when Mr. Mandeville begged, for decency's sake, that he might at least have his shirt left. The governor, says the report, threw the sheet over him and raised him up, when the sick and outraged man tottered to his cot and fell upon it. This was on a winter's night. Mr. Mandeville was a consumptive and afflicted with diarrhoes; yet, in addition to the abuse described above he was kept, on alternative days, on bread and water. His wife has described his sufferings as being intense; and the nationalists have charged that the man succumbed to the bru tality to which he was doomed. The situation has been made more tragic by the suicide of Dr. Dudley, the medical officer of the gaol, who become worried by the revelations made at the inquest, and would not

face the odum of his connection with them.

The Growth of Deseronto.

The population of Deseronto is over 3,200, having increased 50 per cent in the last three years; the assessment roll this year is \$396,500, having been increased about \$100, 000 since last year. The rate of taxation was 25 miles on the dollar, and will likely be less this year. The assets of the village show there is an excess over liabilities of \$7,556.98. Last year there was expended on the streets alone \$1,559.24, and probably this year the amount will be increased. Next January Deseronto will be a town, and will then be governed by a mayor, reeve, deputy reeve and nine councillors.

Getting Ready to Build. At Picton a by-law was introduced and passed through committee to raise \$30,000, to construct water works. The bill is to issue debentures to extend over the period of thirty years, to be repaid by an equal annual sum of \$1,951.64, including interest. EFFECT OF THE MILLS' BILL.

Some Changes it Will Work-Republicans will Shortly Operate Upon it. NEW YORK, July 27. - The Herald's

Washington special says the republican senators were induced to bring in a tariff bill by Mr. Allison, who told them that if they went home, having refused to act upon the Mills' bill, or to produce some measure of their own, as so many of them desired to do, President Cleveland would summons them to an extra session in September. It is said that the wool and woollen duties will remain as in the present law, except that worsted will be raised. Steel rails will be cut down to \$14; they are now \$17, and the Mills' bill cut them down to \$11. Sugar and rice are to be cut down .) per cent. There will be a general reducing in chemicals, glass and pottery, and the tobacco tax is repealed, and alcohol for the arts made free. Hoop iron, cotton, and hay ties are raised, also tin and slates. The democrats declare that the Mills' bill must have the fullest discussion, and it is possible, therefore, that congress will sit until the middle of October. Senator Ingalls said yesterday that as soon as the republican tariff bill passes the senate the two party measures will go into conference, and there the tariff legislation for this session will end. That point ought to be reached by the middle of August, and then congress might as well adjourn.
