

PAYING FOR PROTECTION.

The Hamilton Spectator is continually making discoveries. Its last is that the Belgians can make water pipes so much cheaper than the Canadians because the wage of the one class is so much lower than that of the other. The argument would be rather plausible, but for the experience the United States. ACTION IS BEGUN.

The American congress has very quickly acted on the recommendation of the secre tary of the treasury, and has had placed be. fore it by Mr. Dingley a bill authorizing the imposition of discriminatory tolls upon Canadian vessels passing through the Sault Se Marie canals. That action has been de. ferred at all has been suggestive, and of nothing so much as a reconsideration of the whole subject by the American and Cana. dian governments. It is alleged that the dominion administration violated the Washington government in spirit and in fact when it adopted the method now in use of encouraging traffic by way of the St. Law rence canals. The government, with a desire to promote the export trade via the St. Lawrence, has passed an order-in-council granting a rebate of tolls on all good passing through the Welland and St. Lawrence canals to Montreal for shipment thence to practiced here. Europe. If goods pass from Lake Erie through the Welland canal only they pay a toll of 20 cents a ton whether their destina. tion be a port on the Canadian or American side of Lake Ontario; while if they pass on down through the St. Lawrence canals, whether in Canadian or American vessels, a rebate of 18 cents a ton is granted. So far, therefore, there is no discrimination practised against our neighbours. But inasmuch as goods can be carried from Lake Erie through the Welland canal by way of Oswe. go to tide-water, and when so carried are subject to the full toll of twenty cents a ton. whereas if taken to Montreal a toll of only two cents is exacted, the claim of an unfair discrimination against American trade is set

The Montreal Gazette, which has given the matter close attention, is sure that prudence and regard for the transportation and other interests of Canada will cause the removal of the shadow of a pretext for the proposed discrimination.
