DUNN COULDN'T WAIT,

A Montreal Convict With Two Mouths to Serve Breaks Jail.

MONTREAL, Aug. 2 -A most daring and successful attempt to break jail took place this morning. James Dunn, an old shoemaker who celebrated his 33rd birthday in jail a few days ago, was under sentence of two years' hard labor for indecent assault. GAMBLERS IN STOCKS.

The Men Arrested at Hanrahan's in Toronto Heavily Fined.

TORONTO, Aug. 3. - The nine men arrested in Hanrahan & Co's office on July 20 were brought to trial at the police court yesterday. The defendants were charged with unlawfully playing in a common gaminghouse - Logan, the manager with being the keeper of such a house, a count being added against three of the accused charging them with making a contract for the purchase of certain shares of railroad stock in which no delivery of the stock was intended or made "with the intent to make profit by the fall of the price in such stock," the prosecution being umler Senator Abbott's "Bucket Shop Bill, passed at the last session of Parlia

Inspector Archibald who was in charge of the squad which made the arrest testified that when he entered the office Logan was writing and on the desk beside him was

testified to six or seven "deals" in stocks and oil on which he lost about \$60. No evidence was given fort he defendants. The contention of the defence was first that the defendants were being tried under one act, the Gaming Act, for carrying on transactions which another act, the Stock Act, declared illegal, secondly that the certificates and other papers seized were not "instruments of gaming," under the act, and third that the contracts were made not in Toronto but in Buffalo, and that the Cana-
