SWINDLED OUT OF \$20,000.

How a Montreal Cashler Misused His Posi-

tion-His Conduct is shown Up. MONTREAL, Aug. 13 .- Benny, McPherson & Co. have just discovered that their cashier, who disappeared last summer, and whose body was subsequently found in the canal, had been, during the six years he was in their employ, carrying on a gigantic system of fraud, by which they have been victimized to the extent of \$20,000. In order to prevent discovery by an audit he went to the head of the firm and said that, being the only support of his relatives, he would prefer to work through the holidays and get some extra remuneration. The head of the firm, having full confidence in the lad, and admir ing the spirit in which the request seemed to be made, readily consented to the arrangement. After the death of the clerk, which occurred under unusually painful circumstances, it was made public that the deceased had left considerable property in real estate. Mr. McPherson became suspicious and ordered an examination of the books with this result. It was decided to communicate with his friends, and a settlement was made. The name of the clerk is suppressed for the sake of his family.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 13. - Further advices regarding the volcanic eruptions in Japan state that the small villages of Kishazawa, Akinota and Hozono, in Hinokihara-Mura, were covered with sand and ashes, and the sight on which they stood is thrown into a mountain. The number of persons burned in these villages is entirely unknown. ANOTHER BRAWLING BROOD.

A Conspiracy to Overthrow the Greenway Government-A Nice Leak Out. WINNIPEG, Aug. 13 .- The Sun says there is a conspiracy to defeat the Greenway government. It was learned that letters had been sent to country members, elected to support the government, asking them to join the conspiracy and overthrow the government. It has been insinuated that Mesers. Greenway and Martin have secured gigantic boodle out of the Northern Pacific deal, and other dirty things have been said. The letter alleges that already a majority of the house are in with the conspirators, and it further states that the Free Press is in line with the scheme. It is impossible to learn the name of the person, as there is a P. S. attached to them all : 'Don't show this to anyone.' A reporter set to work to look into the matter, and after a searching inquiry into the case succeeded in reaching the conviction that the Hudson's Bay railway company 'pushers' are at the bottom of it. They have been openly declared for some time that if the Guarantee act was put in force things would be all right, but if they did not it was fight and for this they prepared. Several names of members of the house were mentioned as being in the conspiracy, one in particular being quoted. It is impossible, however, at this writing to say what there is in the report, as members would certainly be most cautious in connect. ing themselves with any such scheme.

A CALAMITY IN JAPAN.

The Horrors of Earthquake and Volcano ...The Dead and Wounded,

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Aug. 13 .- The steamer City of Sydney, which arrived last evening from Hong Kong and Yokohama, brings Japanese journals containing particulars of a volcanic eruption of Bandai San. On the morning of the 15th the small. er Bandai San tumbled and roared violently. Almost immediately afterwards ashes began to fall, and the sky suddenly grew dark, and the rumbling sounds continued, accompanied by a violent earthquake and flare of dazzling flame. The crest of the smaller Bandai San appeared to be lifted bodily upwards, and then to fall again with a tremen. dous noise. Then followed showers of red mud, mingled with large stones. Above the mud fell a few inches of ashes. In the five villages of Iwase, Youan, Wakamiga, Misate and Hibara the greater part of the houses were burned to a depth of from seven to twenty feet. The state of the bodies recovered is terrible. It is scarcely possible to distinguish between men and women. A they fell. Up to the 17th the number of bodies recovered is 476. It is believed that 81 are still entombed. The wounded num bered 41. Eighty-seven houses have been destroyed.
