DETROIT, July 13 .- The first business taken up by the national convention of the Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners at Hanover College. their session Saturday morning was the selection of a place for holding the next biennial convention. The contest was between Cincinnati and Chicago, and resulted at last in a victory for the latter city.

THE BIG RAFT ENDS ITS TRIP. Crowds Watch it from the Shore and Brook.

lyn Bridge. NEW YORK, Aug., 13. - From Hell Gate to the Battery, all the water front was or the watch Saturday morning for the appear ance of the great Joggins-Leary raft from Nova Scotia. She lay anchored all night off College Point, and at the break of day her crew and those on the tug prepared for the final trip through Hell Gate. With day break came scores of boats of all descrip-

tions from the surrounding shores, filled

with people anxious to inspect the great mass of floating logs.

No such forest of lumber had ever passed through Hell Gate. If the 3,000,000 feet of spruce timber were packed in schooners for shipment it would have loaded a fleet of fifty vessels. By 10 o'clock the tide had risen and three tugs had arrived from the city to lend a hand in steering the big cigarshaped craft to its haven. The Boston tug Underwriter, which helped to bring the raft from Joggins, took a line off the bow and led the fleet, and the Ocean King, the Underwriter's consort, tuck her prow into the stern of the raft, and the procession began.

At first they moved slowly and with great caution, but the affair soon became a triumphant procession, and they steamed with greater confidence. A slight chb tide pushed against and helped to hold back and

steer the big craft.

It was noon when Flood Rock was reached and the craft entered Hell Gate. Two more tugs were at land and made fast to the floating forest. With this escort she moved easily past the dangerous points, holding well to the west shore. Flags were flying from all the tugs, and a Union Jack and an American flag were floating in the light breeze fore and aft from the gars of the raft itself.

The big chained forest was towed down the East River, under the Brooklyn Bridge, where crowds cheered it, around the Battery toward Bedlow's Island, and then into the Erie Basin, where it was safely moored.

Ratpan, a friend of the General's rushed forward and managed to turn th weapon aside. The result was that Ratpa himself received a bullet in the back of hi head but his wound is not serious. Tw peasants were also wounded. Gen. Boula ger was not touched. Prof. Perrin is friend of Mayor Lair, the candidate nomiated by the Opportunists in opposition Boulanger. The affair occurred at the height of a pitched battle between the riv political parties, when the gendarmes char ing, Count Dillon received a blow on the head from a stick and other Boulangeris' were roughly handled. It is not certain that Perrin intended to aim at Boulanger.
