

A TIRADE OF ABUSE. The Canada Pacific railway has been specially attacked of late by the New York

the highway of its most virulent abuse. The cause of all this will appear by reading be. tween the lines. Some American or personal interests are being affected by the Canadians' enterprise hence it is declared :

a standing menace to some of the largest and most substantial of our interests. It is a political and stragetic railroad, not a commercial undertaking, and the design is that now, from the very outset, it shall be maintained at the expense of our American railroads. The rates which it establishes, when it carries a train load of tea from Vancouver to New York, are not commercial rates. They are not regulated by an honest freight tariff. They are the expedients of subdized and piratical competitor, retained and bound by no ordinary commercial considerations."

"As if it were not bad enough that our railroads should have to endure such competition, their condition is made intolerable by the operation of the inter-state commerce law, which prohibits them from meeting the rate of their free-booting competitor, and making a square fight for the business. Thus we are confronted with the extraordinary spectacle of a dishonest and maliggnant attack upon American enterprise and American property, carried on under the | declares: "We favor direct taxation rather protection of an American statute!

"We are glad to see that the repeated and earnest protests of the Sun have had their effect at Washington, and have at last fixed the attention of congress upon this gross and dangerous abuse. It is not to be supposed that the United States will stand idly by and see the investment of millions of American citizens preyed upon securely by unprincipled privateers, whose letters of marque, issued at Ottawa, are submissively countersigned by the inter-state commerce commission at Washington."

The interstate commerce commission may be scared, by this coarse talk, and it may not. The Canada Pacific is not under very much obligation to it, and may be able to get along without even the few favours which it does enjoy; certainly it will not alter its course one tittle because the Sun, on behalf of certain American capitalists, calls it the foulest names. The Sun, by the way, is not the dictator of the railway policy of either Canada or the United States, and it is of small consequence what it thinks of the same. It drove Levi Morton off the directorate of the C.P.R., but he is a candidate for office and more sycophantic than the average of his race.

TRIBUTE TO CANADA.

The London Standard has a brilliant article upon the progress, present position and future prospects of Canada. It is evidently from the pen of one who is an admirer of all things Canadian. "In 1867," says the writer, "when the British North American act was passed, Ontalio, Quebec, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and British Columbia were isolated states, teeming with future possibilities it is true, but actually small, and to all appearance powerless. Now they are a nation with enormous resources, a vast commerce, a well-organized military establishment, a splendid system of railway communication, and every quality, except population, which is required for a great and powerful state. Canadian enterprise and ambition have risen by leaps and bounds since the opening up of the magnificent territories in the north-west. When parliament almost contemptously threw the whole of British North America on Saturday. into the lap of the new Dominion it scarce. ly realized the magnitude of its gift. was supposed that the land beyond the lakes and the forty-ninth parallel was for the most part a desolate Arctic wilderness, which would be useful only to the trapper and the hunter. MURDERED FOR WITCHCRAFT.

A Parent Killed the Woman Whom All the Village Greatly Dreaded.

MEXICO, Aug. 15. - A man named Medina will be tried for witch killing. In a village not far distant an old woman levied monthly tribute on all the families, threatening those who refused with killing their children by sucking their blood through their noses. She surrounded herself with all the paraphrenalia of witchcraft, such as brooms, tom cats, and strange instruments. She would often go on a large, open moor or top of the hills, where the superstitious inhabitants of the village watched her with awe, making wild gestures, uttering cries or gazing for hours together at the horizon. All the village regarded her with dread. A short time since a godchild of Medina's died, and meeting the witch Medina asked her why she had killed his godchild. She answered that the had done it because its father had refused to pay her a monthly tax. Medina then turned away, muttering that he would be revenged. The witch, hearing him, threatened to take the life of Medina's own child, and he then attacked her, and dealt her two or three furious blows, leaving her lifeless. Medina has been brought to this city.
