

INSTITUTE APPOINTMENT.

The collegiate institute board applied to the department of education for permission for Mr. Gunn, the excellent modern lan guage master, to qualify by passing the training institute examination. The department refused on the ground that it cannot recog. nize foreign degrees. The board, therefore, very reluctantly has released Mr. Gunn. It does seem strange that a Canadian, (as he is), going to Europe and passing with honour after long study of foreign languages, in universities of higher grade than those of Canada, cannot be engaged to teach those languages in his own land. He is practical ly punished for his ambition and enterprise. Few teachers in Canadian high schools can impart French and German conversationally, because they studic'l under most disadvantagecus conditions in Ontario; yet a teacher superior to the many in this respect must go because he has not taken his course in an inferior school. Boards which cannot look to continental graduates for the best qualified teachers of continental languages, may reasonably doubt whether the best teachers of English are to be found among an English speaking people. In every other subject of a high school course the policy of "Canada for the Canadians" will find admirers, but in the modern language department it is illogical and injurious to the best interests of edu. cation. The sooner the department regulations are relaxed in this regard the better. College authorities here and elsewhere share in this opinion.

The Kingston board has been fortunate, although over half the applicants confessed a lack of conversational knowledge, in securing for the vacancy a gentleman qualified in Canada in addition to several years of study in Europe. Mr. Daniel Conboy, who studied in Toronto university, and held the modern language chair in Hamilton collegiate institute for three years, will assume duty here on Sept. 1st. He was among the applicants for a similar chair in Queen's college.

A JUDGE IMPEACHED.

Judge Miller, of Halton county, has been accused of offences which, in his own interest and in that of the bench, should be investigated without delay. It is a misfortune, so far as the treaty is concerned, that the consideration of it came before the senate on the eve of an election, since it has inspired attacks upon interests in no way directly involved in the presidential contest. At another time, in all probability, the treaty would have been ratified as the best settlement that could be effected of the fishery difficulty, and the people would have been spared the sensations in which the United States senators indulge. The American politicians are talking the rankest nonsense about Canada. They have done this with the object of scaring our people, and they have affrighted themselves. It was only the other day that Congressman Nutting, of New York, asserted that he saw in the construction of a dry-dock at Kingston an undoubted intention of the British government to establish a hugh paval depot here. But what was meant to be a still more alarming project on the part of the British and Canadian authorities was the arming and sending out of armed cruisers by these countries to bombard Chicago and

One of these was the little steam yacht Cruiser, which is engaged in fishery inspection, and is without armament save that which is represented by the captain's pocketpistol. But Congressman Nutting did not know or care about this; he had an object to serve in depicting the dangers to which the American marine was exposed; he wanted an appropriation for a dry-dock at some Lake Ontario port, and he said the most he could to warrant the voting of the money. It is a compliment to Canada, an evidence of the effect of that senate "bluff." that her progress and the possibility of her becoming a menace to the republic are used as arguments in support of a waste of her surplus revenue. Such "bluff" Canada can stand no matter when and how it is played.
