

COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

THE MARKETS REVIEWED.

Leading Features at Home and Abroad-A Scarcity of Good Butter.

Toronto, Aug. 28, - Business was quiet on the St. Lawrence market yesterday morning. The supply was small and there was no change in prices. Tomatees still kept up in price. Pickling cucumbers sold at 20c to 30c per hundred. The supply of apples was small and they sold at \$1,25 to THE TO HER WATER TO HER BUT AND HER BUT AND THE and butter 18c to 26c. A'l the good butter that can be got is wanted.

Buffalo cheese market reports 4750 boxes sold at 85c and 300 boxes on commission, the market being weak and the offerings 68 to boxes, including 1800 boxes of Cloverfield, which were not so d. At Little Falls the transactions were 56 lots at 81c, 71 lots at 8 c, 3 lots at private terms and 7 lots on commission, total 8952 boxes. Thirty packages of creamery butter sold at 20e to 21c, with the bulk 121c, and eighteen packages of farm dairy at 18c to 19c. The Utica market was unexpectedly lively, the transactions being 13,915 boxes and the ruling price 8;c.

On the hay market a few loads changed hands at \$21 per ton. Straw brought \$11 to \$13. Between 400 and 500 bushels of oats were offered on the grain market and sold at an average of 37c. One load of wild goose wheat I rought 78 to per bushel. No barley was offered.

At the Board of Trade call board 98 cents was offered for No. 2 red winter, but no transactions were made.

ANCASTER, Aug. 27. -On Saturday morning Mr. W. H. Shaver lost a valuable horse, the animal dropping dead in front of Mr. Bristol's place.

He took some of the assets of both banks and disposed of most of his personal property. Mr. Koon is abundantly able to satisfy depositors and all deposits will be paid. There was little or no run on the bank vesterday morning and all is quiet now. Mr. Northrup will meet all the obligations on the Reading Bank. Waldron leaves a wife-and two children and before going away he deeded his wife a small portion of his property.
