

STE. FLAVIE, Que., Aug. 29.-It is reported that on Saturday last the steamship Bratsberg, on her way up," struck upon a rock at Cape Chatte. THE STORM IN NOVA SCCTIA.

Several Persons Struck by Lightning-Much Damage Done to Property.

HALIFAX, Aug. 29. - A young back driver named Fredrick Spain was struck by lightning during the storm Monday night. He was picked up insensible but recovered consciousness in a short time and yesterday was all right. The side of his head and face were badly scarred. The hack suffered some damage, a wheel and shaft being shattered.

During the ten days which elapsed he wasn't doing anything but trying to get married. He worked every day at it, leaving his sign-painting business to run itself. First he went to Justice Eberhardt's office with Lena on his arm. A minute later the bride turned and fled like a frightened fawn, and her lover could not persuade her to return or explain her caprice. Early the next morning they went to exchange vows before another justice. Again the fair Lena ran away. During the three succeeding days the couple visited three other justices, but in each instance the result was the same. On Monday they called on Justice Blume, who tied the knot, and did it in a hurry at the groom's special request. The latter has since obtained from his wife an explanation of her capricious conduct. She did not want to be married by one justice because he wore spectacles. Another was too small, another was bald-headed, another more so, and another looked too cross. Justice Blume, however, came up to the bride's ideal of a judge, and she stood her ground.

BROKER E. S. COX IN COURT.

Ball Refused and the Ex-Financier Lodged

tm Jatt. Toronto, Aug. 29 .- There was a big crowd in the Police Court building when Edward Strachan Cox was arraigned before Ald. Baxter, J. P., on a charge of defrauding the Central Bank, or, as the information reads, that "In this city, in the month of November last, the said Cox did unlawfully defraud the Central Bank of \$10,000, and converted the same to his own use." Gaily and smilingly the ex-President of the Baseball Association tripped upstairs from the cells and into the dock, from which vantage point he nodded to his numerous acquaintances in court. Messrs, Howland and Gooderham surveyed the scene from a corner of the room, Mr. Murdoch and Mr. Galt appeared for the captive and Mr. Badgerow for the Crown. The latter asked for a week's ad journment

"We have no objection to the remand, but I now make application that the dofendant be admitted to bail," replied Mr. Murdoch, who then entered into an argument sustaining his application. His argument was based upon the fact that the offence charged is a misdemeanor and not a felony, and is therefore a bailable offence. Law points were quoted to prove this. To this Mr. Baxter replied that this misdemeanor was so near a felony in magnitude that he would decline to grant bail, though Mr. Murdoch might apply to a Superior 4," said the Court, and Coa manded to Sept.

I may say that my own conviction has been strengthened by an interview with andge McMahon and the Deputy Attorney-General, and I must not hesitate to
