



A Toronto Chinaman's Little Love Affair-How Ching-a-Ling Won His Bride.

TORONTO, Aug. 30. - There is said to be s regular traffic in Chinese women among the traders and Chinese of the Pacific Province, and so openly has the shameless bargaining that country started a Rescue Home to abate the evil. The traffic is still, however, indulged in, and reports from Victoria state that scores of these women have been forcibly kidnapped and sold into slavery, or into bondage much worse. For the first sime in the history of the city, Toronto is now able to boast of having within her limits a Chinese woman, and she was brought here under somewhat extraordinary circumstances, being discovered finally by Staff-Inspector Archabold. Some months ago a Chinaman of Toronto, who is pretty welloff financially, and whose name is something like Hoof-Poof, made up his mind to secure a Chinese woman, and for this purpose dispatched a Celestial named Ching-a-Ling to Victoria, B. C., to kidnap one for him,

handing him over \$400 for that purpose. Ching-a-Ling started for the scene of his exploits at once, and on last Friday returned to Toronto with a pretty little Chinese woman. A jealous acquaintance, however, unfolded the tale to Inspector Archabold, who made the fullest inquiries and learned fell in love with his wife and refused to hand her over to the tender mercies of Mr. Hoof-Poof. The latter called a meeting of his friends and made a demand that Chinga Ling should either pay him \$800, double the amount he had advanced, or hand over the bride.
