PULLS A MERCHANT QUITE STRONGLY.

property in Madoc. He Buys Clothing and Then has a Draft for \$500 Endorsed-The Swindler Skips out-Trying to Beat Livingston Bros., But the Game Didn't Work.

"Rev. M. C. Pullman, Chicago, Itl.," was the name printed on a thin white card presented to several merchant tailors yesterday. The owner of the card was attired inclerical robes, white tied and plug hatted. untidy appearance about the individual that made one tailor, at least, suspicious. The fellow claimed to belong to the noted Pullman family, who own valuable property among the Thousand Islands, and whose "Castle Rest" is the admiration of excursionists. He said he had just come from the islands. He came to buy clothing, because he could get it ever so much cheaper than in the states.

He visited W. E. Dorland and contracted for an overcoat and several suits, the value of his purchases netting \$70. His measured were taken, but as Mr. Dorland had not the samples of nappa cloth desired the clergyman agreed to call later and see them. He came again about 3 o'clock, and being satisfied Smith a Palla But about payment willis. Rev. Mr. Pallman hadn't sufficient money so he asked Mr. Dorland where a bank could be found, as he wished to have a draft cashed. Mr. Dorland put on his hat and accompanied the divine to the Ontario bank, where a draft for \$500 was presented. Mr. Greet said he could not cash it as he did not know the gentleman. He asked Dorland if he would endorse the note. Mr. Dorland did so, having the utmost confidence that Rev. Mr. Pullman was what he professed to be. The money was paid over, and Mr. Dorland was given the \$70 for his clothing. Then the clergyman left, holding the remainder of the cash, \$420. He has not been seen since. The police authorities have the case in hand.

The minister tried to beat Livingston Bros. also. He visited the store, looked over some clothing, promised to return in the afternoon, and left his card. He returned, was suited with the cloth, had his measure taken, and ordered the goods to be sent to Smith's Falls. Then when he discovered that he had not sufficient cash, he asked one of the firm if he could tell him where there was an exchange, as he wished to have a draft cashed. The hour was four o'clock, so the purchaser was shown the way to Folger's. But as there was no offer to cash the draft, or to go with the individual he disappeared and the order for clothing, amounting to \$113, remains unpaid. "We never cash drafts for strangere," said Mr. Livingston, "and that saved us from being bit. D'ye know I was suspicious of the fellow. There was not that air of refinement about him that you would have expected from the Pullman's. When he went out the first time I said, 'He's a dead beat,' and my conclusions were further confirmed when the cutter said, 'That fellow's no clergyman; I smelt a strong odor of whiskey about him."

Early yesterday morning the swindler arrived at the British American hotel walked to the counter of the office and signed in a bold round hand "M. E. Pullman, Pullman, Ill." He ordered breakfast and after partaking of the meal paid the proprietor

"Are you related to the Pullmans of Chi cago, said Mr. Dunham. The stranger said very cooly, "Oh, yes, I am a nephew to Mr. Pullman."

This was all the conversation that passed between Mr. Dunham aad his guest. When the "made up clergyman" wanted to leav the city, after transacting business with Dorland, he went to the hotel, and discarded the silk hat for a common felt one. He dropped into Folger Bros', office to buy a ticket for Gananoque. He asked Mr. Goodearle in sof language for his card. Goodearle took particular notice of the style of the stranger and did not like his countenance. The card was refused. On getting the ticket the impostor got on the steamer Princess Louise, and during the whole of the trip sat near the engine. Eugineer Donnelly was attracted by him and watched him sharply. He did not con verse with any person and looked gloomy. He got off at Gananoque.

As soon as Dorland discovered that he had been "let in" by the man he stated his case at the police office. Officer Snodden was given the matter to investigate, and he and Dorland started for Gananoque where they expected to catch Pullman. At seven o'clock this morning, before the Princess Louise left Gananoque, Snodden and Dorland were seen. They had not found the crook, but were hoping to see him board some of the steamers starting from Gananoque for the islands and Clayton. It is thought that he is now safe in the United Two hours after the Princess Louise reached Gananoque yesterday the Junita, a small ferry steamer, left for Clay ton. On this boat it is thought Mr Puilman left Canada.

When Dorland and Pullman went to the bank the swindler asked the rate on drafts to Chicago. He was told. He demurred, saying he thought it would be cheaper. Mr. Greet said it would have been had the draft been on New York. Mr. Greet asked for an endorser and turning to Mr. Dorland he said: "Do you know Mr. Pullman?"

"Oh yes," was the reply, and immediately he endorsed the draft. It was from the First National bank of Appleton, Wisconsin, on the Merchants' National bank, Chicago, and called for \$500.

"Rev. Mr. Pullman" while in the city speut much of the day in wandering about in the tailor shops mentioned. Several times he spoke about "Castle Rest when the subject was broached, but he seemed disinclined to say much. There are several of the Pullman's clergymen but none of the name given by the swindler.

Officer Snodden and Dorland returned to the city to-day without Mr. Pullman. They could not trace him at Gananoque. No person saw him there.


