FORCING IT & HROUGH. The house of representatives has passed the retaliation bill, as it was expected to do, being democratic in sentiment and bound to vote in Cleveland's interest. It now awaits the action of the senate. The measure did not pass the lower house without a sharp criticism from its opponents. The fact was developed that some of those who voted for retaliation, as a political expedient, were not at all in favor of it, but they had their misgivings in regard to it, that they feared it was an invention in the use of which there was no telling what injury would be done. The republicans were, of course, plain-spoken, and, like the grits in Canada, incurred great displeasure by a close adherence to the truth. The situation is changing and slowly unfolding itself to the peo-

ple. At first some men were inclined to impetuously applaud the suggestion of retaliation in non-interference with the Canadians, but they labored under the impression that Canada was less independent than she really is, that the abandonment of her to her "fate" really meant the upbuild ing of a purely Canadian trade against FOR - YOUNG - MEN - AND - BOYS | which the only objections were distance and indirectness. The commerce of the country has not to pass through American territory as a matter of necessity, and the blow aimed at the bonded traffic is not so fatal in its tendencies as it seems to be. The first part of the retaliation bill is there fore destined to be without effect. It will certainly oblige the Canadians, as Sir John Macdonald said yesterday, to be more derendant on each other for success, to rely ada. more upon their own resources and less upon the facilities of their neighbours. Canada and the East. As colonial secretary Lord Stanley became familiar with occurrences in Canada, and in the outset the government will have the

advantage of information regarding this country which it has taken his predecessors a long time to acquire. He will be enabled to improve or correct by observation his impressions of Canadian affairs. He is willing, yea, eager, to make bimself acquainted with the position of the people and the resources of the country and to make it convenient to accept any appointment which is conducive to the accomplishment of his plans.

Lord Stanley will be agreeably surprised or ed in the city. Kingston has been known as the historic city but it is such no longer. It has its memories—and they will live in history-but it has also the progressive spirit which is displaying itself in so many ways, and by the cultivation of which greater material results, will be secured in the future than in the past. Some of its older institutions will possess great interest for him, and so will the newer institutions, including that in connection with which his visit to the city will be especially marked. It is to be hoped the people, as they are sure to do, will contribute all they can to the pleasure of his visit and low and les with the server the city with the kindest and best recollections of his visit. A sufficient supply has not yet arrived from the printers, but as soon as it does, allowing time for signing, the old notes will be withdrawn from circulation. Mr. W. Smith, the regular signer, will be assisted by a staff of five or six clerks, and it is expected that with these it will be several months before the task of fixing the countersign will be completed.

The denominations of the new bills are 5's, 10's, 20's and 100's. They are all handsome pieces of the engraver's art, and counterfeiter will find that they are his despair as well as the artist's delight. The backs of the bills are covered with an artistic blending of almost every kind of lathe work ever brought into use on bank bills. The faces are also distinguished for the beauty of the engraving and the intricacy of the design. It would be time misspent for the counterfeiter to attempt a also turned aside. The yellow tint photographs an inky black and is so indefinitely blended at the borders with the other colors that it is absolutely impossible to photograph.

The face of the 5 shows Literature reclining gracefully in flowing drapery, arm leaning negligraving was done by the oldest and most successful engraver in the world, Alfred Jones of New York. On the opposite side of the note, the right hand side, is the bank's seal. The body of the face is filled in with the usual declaration, and the figure 5, in multiplied forms, constitutes the border. 
