
W. D. Hoard, the Republican nominee for governor of Wisconsin, has during his 52 years of life been a farmer, a soldier, an editor, a dairyman and again a farmer. He is also a most artistic story teller.

When the war broke out he was living in Lake Mills, Jefferson county, Wis, He was the first man to volunteer from that town, and on May 21, 1861, he joined the Fourth regiment of Wisconsin volunteers. Among the battlefields on which he fought was that of Cedar Creek, in the Shenandoah valley. One of his best stories is of this battle.




