London's Murder Mystery.

LONDON, Sept. 13. - London is still deeply absorbed in speculation and curiosity over the Whitechapel horror. The strange series of brutal murders that has excited the people from one end of the city to the other is the subject of varied comment and suggestion. Every day finds fresh editorial mention of the crimes in the newspapers, supplemented by numerous letters to the editors containing suggestions pertinent or absurd. The criminal, whoever he may be, remains was afforded in the finding at Pimlico of a woman's arm which had been cast up by the Thamcson the embankment. The arm had the appearance of being torn from the shoulder and altogether was a ghastly discovery to make at this inopportune time. Very possibly the arm had been rejected by a medical student, and had connection with nothing more tragic than a dissecting table. Londoners, however, are in the humor now to accept the theory of a new tragedy, and this assumption is affirmed by the recent finding at Guilford of a dissevered foot and leg which had evidently been boiled. This Guilford mystery has not been solved, and no explanation of it has yet been offered that is satisfactory. The present excitement over these matters is intense.

A Rejected Lover's Suicide. TERRE HAUTE, Ind., Sept. 12. - Frank Martin, a barber called at the home of Lina Webber, to whom he had been paying at tentions, and committed suicide in her presence. The girl heard he was a married man and told him he would have to stop coming to see her. After she had positively refused to longer receive his visits he took out a pencil and began writing on a piece paper. When he had finished he pulled out a revolver and holding it to his right temple fired. He fell dead on the floor, The note he left was to his father, and sim ply declared his intention to commit suicid and asked that no expense be incurred burying him. Martin was 24 years old.

An Ontario Miser's Wealth. THOMAS, Sept. Thomas people, among whom were Chief Fewings, Dr. Luton, J. Crocker, and about eight other intimate friends of Henry Whitlock, a farm laborer living alone in a small dwelling on the Edgeware road, Yarmouth, Monday drove out to the residence of Whitlock with a view of inducing the man, who is on his deathbed, to reveal the hidingplace of several thousand dollars of which he is believed to be the possessor. Although he has been informed that his hours are numbered Whitlock refuses to make a will and denies the reports which are current that he has \$8000 or \$10,000 concealed on the Westlake farm upon which he resides. Fifteen or twenty years ago he was known to posssess \$6000 or \$7000 in cash, and as he has worked constantly since and never spends any money it is believed that he has hoarded his money and buried it in the ground near his lonely cabin. It is with a view of unearthing this treasure and having the dying man make a proper disposition of the wealth that his friends have gone out to see him. Whitlock is 65 years of age.

Twice Duped by Deceit.ul Men. St. Thomas, Sept. 13.—About a year ago a widow owning property at Straffordville and vicinity, and living in the west end of St. Thomas, was united in marriage to an elderly professional man. He left for Sandytown and collected a considerable amount in rent and never returned.
