MILITIA COM-PANIES CALLED OUT.

gagement Feared To-Day-The Rails Torn Up by the Infurinted Laborers.

MONTREAL, Sept. 28.—The riotous Italian laborers and the militia in Compton County are now face to face and a conflict is expected at any moment. On arrival at Sawyerville, the troops, composing 225 infantry of the 58th Battalion and two troops cavalry, were met by 200 Italians in a body apparently armed to the teeth, Several times during the journey the train bearing the soldiers was delayed by rails being removed by the rioters, but these gaps were covered by marching.

crossing into the States. The rioters appear to be acting upon the presumption that the men working on the railway have the same right of lien as the men have in certain states of the Union. A construction train loaded with iron rails was stopped in the vicinity of this work of destruction. this point an American crew, numbering some forty or fifty men, have been at work laying rails. They were stopped twice by the Italians at the beginning of the week, but yesterday they became determined to continue their work and have procured arms from Stewartston, at the other side of the line, so that if they are molested by the Italians they are resolved to keep on, even if they have to resort to their arms to defend themselves.

The chief contractor for the road is Enoch G. Sweet, of Woonsocket, R.I., and he will suffer most, after the men, by the absconding of the contractors, who leave fully \$50,000 indebtedness behind them. Mr. Sweet is prepared to take the men on again and pay them, but they will not hear of

Another Mattawa Tragedy. OTTAWA, Sept. 28. - Another tragedy is reported from Mattawa. It appears that a dispute took place between W. G. DETROIT, Sept. 28. - About fifteen of the thirty-three wemen who were married to James W. Brown, the champion bigamist since 1883, confronted him in the recorder's a week later. court. The list of victims included Helen Brewnlee and Annie Winters of Chicago, who, with Annie M. Hazel, Mary Benjamin and Nancy Robertson, were called to give evidence. Th. Benjamin woman was the prosecuting witness. It was established that Brown's method was to advertise for a housekeeper, and select as a victim the one who pleased him the most, and marry her as soon as possible. He would desert her after a few days. Five clergymen of the city certified to marrying-Brown to as many different women, and the case against him was so clear that the prosecutor left it to the jury without argument. Brown testified in his own behalf and made a sorry mess of it. He professed not to remember any of his dupes, asserted that he was only once married, that his wife was dead, and that he had once been confined as a lunatic at New Orleans. Brown looked like a sick man during the trial. Nancy Robertson's indignation couldn't be repressed, and she lenouuced Brown as a perfidious wretch. The jury agreed with her and took but four minutes to find him guilty. Sentence was deferred until the court could further in-

vestigate Brown's doings. DETROIT, Sept. 28. -Brown, the biga mist, was sentenced to four years and a half in the state prison.
