



Strange to say of a man who devotes his pen to nature, Mr. Burroughs never writes in the summer. He spends all his time out of doors during that season, laying up material for the winter's work. He lives within sight of the Catskill mountains, and has a little farm of his own. Dr. Richard J. Levis, the well known Phil-

adelphia surgeon, who recently retired from the active pursuit of his profession, was asked recently how he liked his freedom from duty. "I never before," he said, "knew how beautiful the world was. I never had time to see it. I do not now spend all my time looking at sick people, cripples and dead bodies. am truly enjoying life,"

As he turned the charge exploded, and Mc-Caffrey's back, from his loins to the top of his head, was riddled with particles of sand and gravel, ranging in size from mustard seed to goose shot. Not a square inch of whole skin was left on his back. A doctor spent three hours picking out the largest fragments of rock. McCaffrey's injuries, though extremely painful, were not dangerous, but he must wait until he grows a new skin before he can work.

John Boyle O'Reilly, poet, author and editor of The Boston Pilot, has had some thrilling experiences in his lifetime. At 21 he was sentenced to be shot for disseminating Fenian ideas in the ranks of the Fourth Hussars, of which regiment he was a member. The sentence was commuted to twenty years' penal servitude in West Australia. He escaped at the end of the first year and secured a berth on a whaler, which after a six months' cruise again landed him in Australia. After a number of romantic escapes from capture he finally succeeded in embarking for America.

His Holiness Leo XIII has made the disposition of his household for the ensuing year. It consists of the respectable number of 1,160 persons, exclusive of the Sacred college and the Monsignori. There are 20 majordomos and chamberlains, 190 domestic prelates, 170 secret chamberlains, 6 chamberlains of the cape and sword, 30 officers and 60 guards of Noble guard, 130 supernumerary chamberlains of the "cape and sword," 200 "extraurban" chamberlains of honor, 14 officers of the Swiss and Palatine guards, 7 secret chaplains of honor, 7 extra-urban chaplains of honor, 20 secret clerks, 10 stewards and equerries, and 50 truissiers. There will be abundant space for all, however, as the Vatican, where they are domiciled, contains not less than 11,500 rooms.

The inhabitants of the Oule-Aroun district of Algeria recently discovered a treasure of 500,000 francs concealed in a fissure in a rock. They quietly divided it up among themselves and said nothing about it, but the authorities noticed that many theretofore poverty stricken Arabs were investing in camels and other valuable property, and started an investigation. Now the officials are at their wits' end to get the treasure away from the natives.—Chicago Herald.
