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

When Mr. Stevenson returns he will pass over to him the manuscript embodying the novelist's reflections and discoveries on the voyage, and the sale of this manuscript in America, England and Australia will more than reimburse the syndicate manager. The Eucalyptus for Boilers.

In their official report to Rear Admiral Gherhardi, commandant of the navy yard, a board of naval engineers stated they considered the use of the eucalyptus boiler scale preventive of great advantage in lessening the deposit of scale and in rendering what is deposited soft and easily removable, preventing as it does the scale from adhering to the surface of the boilers. The test had been employed in the steaming boilers of the Richmond for over a year, and the interior surfaces had been kept free from scale without the use of scaling tools, it being only necessary to wash the boilers out with a strong jet of water from the steam hose distilling boilers the deposit of scale was also essened. The interior surfaces of the boilers, these officers reported, show no sign of pitting or corrosion. -- Scientific American.




