He implored her to return to him; but as she remained obdurate, he then threatened, so Christiana swears, to carve her heart and liver out and fry them in a pan. Christiana had him arrested. Laurenson denied Christiana's statement in court yesterday, and said he only came here to obtain her consent to the amputation of one of their child's legs, an operation the doctors refused to perform without the consent of both parents. Justice Gorman extracted from him a promise not to go near the girl again and a \$10 bill as a fine for his conduct.

Mad for Love. NEW YORK, Oct. 18-A case of "gone mad for love" came to light at New Brunswick, N. J., yesterday, when Miss Gertrude Holman, residing on Livingstone-avenue, that city, detailed her story in the Recorder's Court. Miss Holman said that one Joseph King, a respected resident of the Second ward of New Brunswick, had a few moments before threatened to her if him. King, she said, boarder at the Holman residence and had made several proposals of marriage to her. On one occasion he had written out a proposal and had thrown it at her through her sitting-room door. Miss Holman had repulsed King's advances and endeavored to keep out of his way, but he continued to send her love missives, and on Monday night, when she was sitting beside her invalid mother, he had suddenly entered the apartment and attempted to assault her. She screamed and King ran out of the room. Subsequently he returned and asked the girl to marry him, and upon her refusal swore he would kill her. Recor er Houslett-instituted an investigation and ordered King to be arrested. He is still at large, however.

Rivals in Love.

The two men were rivals for the hand of a young lady and Collins won the girl. it is claimed, by some duplicity.
