

Her body was sent home and placed in the vault the Sunday previous to the robbery.

He was immediately thrown and belabored with sticks, one of which penetrated his neck. He fired again three times, whereupon the gas was put out and a general rush made for the doors. The Sthertan Exite System. London, Oct. 27. -Correspondence between Secretary Tallack of the Howard Association and Mr. Solomons, Secretary of the Russian Prisons Administration, apropos of Mr. George Kennan's Century articles upon the Siberian exile system has been made public. Mr Solomons expresses astonishment at the statement in regard to Russian prisons and prisoners made by Kennan, but he says he has long ceased to pay any attention to opinions expressed in foreign periodical publications. He has satisfied himself that Russia cannot expect fair treatment from them, for he has found that in them gross ignorance goes hand-in-

MERCHANTS PURSUING A VATIVE POLICY.

Merchants appear to be purening a conservative policy in all lines, though more contidence is shown in raw wool and boots and shoes than in any other. There is even some speculative buying of woul by those who look for advanced prices after election. Prices of boots and shoes have been advanced by New England manufacturers 25 and 5c, per pair. The exports of merchandise for nine

months of the calendar year are smaller than in any previous year since 1682, but the imports are larger than in any preceding nine months since 1882. The total exports aggregate \$454,832,177 and the imports \$544,507,098 against \$490,463,612

The New York Stock Market is very dell, but showed a moderately strong undertone in the face of a continuance of un losn : bic. and 2ic. Foreign exchange is easier on a free offering on cotton and loan bills, demand sterling \$4.871 and \$4.87

The iron trade shows no sign of gains notwithstanding the repeated reports in la ge orders for bridge and other structural material, and steel rails are 50 cents lower, or \$2750 per ton, only 90 cents above the lowest price ever quoted in the United States. British iron and steel shipments to the United States for nine months of the present year are 486,613 tons against 1,041,-

750 in 1887, a decrease of 53 per cent. Calculations by Bradstreet's, based on official reports, indicate that if 50,000,000 bushels of reserve wheat are to be carried over on June 30, 1889, more than the exportable surplus on the Atlantic coast has already been sent abroad, and if we carry over but 30,000,000 bushels we have 16,-204,000 bushels yet to go abroad. The Pacific coast, however, with 5,000.000 bushels for reserves, still has 26,278,000 bushels of wheat available for export until June 30 next, having already shipped 11,-244,000 bushels. The exports of wheat and flour as wheat, both coasts, amount to 2,-337,916 bushels this week. The exports are 510,570 bushels less than last week and 272,434 more than in the like week in 1887.
