### THE FIRE RECORD.

Wiser & Son's Distillery at Prescott Par-

ttally Bestroyed-Other Losses, PRESCOTT, Oct. 29. -About 3.30 yesterday morning the distillery owned by J. P. Wiser & Son was discovered to be on fire. The hose from the distillery engine was promptly at work, and was assisted by the fire department and engine of this town. Through the united efforts of both departments the fire was kept under control and contined to the distillery proper, which was destroyed, the boiler-house and engine remaining intact. No spirits were destroyed and the Government receivers adjoining the distillery were also saved. For a time the cattle barns, in which were 750 head of cattle, were in great danger but owing to the foofs being very wet by the recent rains, and the fact of the fire being stubbornly fought, these and the surrounding buildings were saved. It is understood that the loss of property is fully covered by insurance, which of course, compensate the loss for stoppage of works at this season of the year, which is the most important. It is estimated it will take about sixty days to put the works in running order. Owing to the recent change in the excise regulations, causing spirits to be stored in fire proof tanks the firm will experience no inconvenience in supplying the trade. Too much praise cannot be accorded to the local fire department, which, with the appliances of the firm and the construction of the premises and fire walls throughout the building, prevented what would have been the most disastrous fire in the history of Prescott.

Bruck by Lightning. FOREST, Oct. 29. - The barns of Robert Do glas, lot 16, concession 13, Plympton, were struck by lightning Saturday and totally burned, with most of the contents. The loss is about \$2500, insured in the East Lambton Mutual for \$1000.

Mr. Phelps made a special point that by treating Murchison as a British subject entitled to advice, despite the fact that he stated in his letter that he was a naturalized citizen of the United States, Lord Sackville-West had disregarded and violated the understanding of September, 1871, when Mr. Fish, then Secretary of State, obtained The detention of Hannah Boyd has as from the English Government a recognition

of the American doctrine of naturalization. Lord Salisbury admitted that this was a most serious point of view of Lord Sack-

ville-West's conduct. The matter is more annoying to Lord Salisbury inasmuch as Lord Sackville-West's appointment originally was attributed to the influence of his sister, who was the second wife of the late Marquis of Salisbury, and wie ha since been married to the present Earl of Derby.

LORD SACKVILLE TO STEP OUT.

The Minister Will be l'ermitted to Retire to Attend to Private Affairs.

LONDON, Oct. 29. -It is distinctly stated upon the highest authority that Minister West, who recently became Lord Sackville, will at once apply to the Foreign Office to be relieved from his post at Washington for the purpose of attending to urgent private affairs in England. This is an easy way out of the Minister's dilemma, but nobody doubts that Lord Salisbury has suggested the remedy. The Foreign Office officials from Lord Salisbury downwa d are horrified at Minister West's breach of etiquette and no concealment is made of the fact.

The Premier and Minister Phelps had an interview of an hour's duration on the subject on Thursday, and resumed their conference on Friday, with the result that Mr. and Mrs. Phelps were invited to Hatfield House, where the two gentlemen will continue and, it is hoped, conclude their diagnosis of the unfortunate Minister's case.

The Daily News says : "Lord Sackville-West has done nothing of which an honest man need be ashamed. But there are blunders which are worse than crimes.

The Daily Telegraph says: " Nothing can excuse the incontinence of Lord Sackville-West's pen except his transparent good faith and candor. He cannot, however, after such betise be allowed to embroil

the two nations, The Standard says : "It would be incorrect to say that the American Government has already asked for the recall of Lord Sackville-West, but it has taken a step little short of that extreme measure. Bayard Stient.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29. -Secretary Bayard refuses either to admit or to deny that he had demanded the recall of Lord Sackville. He denied himself Saturday to most callers at the State Department. To a pointed inquiry sent into his room in writing, regarding a statement made in a Washington despatch to the effect that Minister Phelps had been requested to ask for the recall of Lord Sackville, Mr. Bayard returned the following answer: "I have no commente to make upon the despatch."

Another inquiry, worded a little differently but to the same purpose, brought out the following : "All the facts upon this case have been cabled to Minister Phelps, but no reply has yet been received from him." This leaves it an open question whether Mr. Bayard has really asked for the recall of Lord Sackville or not. It seems to be his desire to create the impression that he has. It seems equally to be his wish that Lord Sackville should not be treated too harshly.

Lord Sackville's forty-three years' service ought, it is being said, to have been a guarantee against the possibility of such interference with the domestic politics of a country to the Government of which he is accredited.

Public comments on this act are even sharper than private. It serves as a text for an editorial article in the Daily Telegraph offensive enough in ton to America to have been written, as it probably was, by an ex-correspondent to the Southern Confederacy. "Lord Sackville," this writer suggests, "must have taken leave of his senses.
