LONDON, Nov. 5. - The Times' Berlin says the replies of the liberal press to the recent address of the emperor to the municipal delegation, are conceived in a spirit of freedom fore, or at least not for a long time, been displayed in the criticism of any act of

King of Prussia or a German emperor. The Vossische Zeitung says it is the duty of the Berlin press to oppose the assumption that an intimacy exists between the municipal authorities and the liberal press, with

The Tagblatt heads an article with the words attributed to Frederick the Great, "Gorzet zollea nicht genieret werden," and argues that the emperor cannot find time himself and must employ middle men to follow the journals. These men are liable to error. "Strong in the community of sentiments between our writers and readers, we still continue to render unto the emperor the things that are the emperor's, and unto the free constitution what belong to it."

#### The Men Starved and Shamefully Treated -An Action Entered for Damages.

TACOMA, Washington Territory, Nov. 5 .-Sixteen sailors of the ship Hecla, which arrived here yesterday with wheat for Great Britain, entered suit in the district court against Capt. Snow, of that vessel, for cruelty. They allege that the Hecla started for Cardiff, Wales, with a crew of sixteen men. After she had been out but a short time the captain began feeding his men on rotten meat and potatoes, which were not fit to eat, and both Capt. Snow and his mate shamefully abused the sailors. While near Cape Horn Capt. Snow attacked the carpenter, breaking his jaw and knocking out many teeth. A few days later he nearly killed one of the men. When the men became debilitated by the poor food and were unable to work they were put in the hold and tied up for forty-eight hours. One of the men was tied to a staunchion for four days. During this time his scant rations (were placed within sight but out of reach When the Hecla reached Acapulce the men were weak from ill-treatment and insufficient food. They were cast into a dungeon and kept confined until the vessel was ready to sail. The men appealed to the U. S. consul at Acapulco but were unable to obtain any assistance.

## A JOB OF LONG AGO.

## The Cornwall Canal Breaks Where a Far-

mer Back in 1837 Saw Danger. MONTREAL, Nov. 5 .- A farmer writes to the Witness: "In the early spring of 1837 I was looking for a job at the digging of the Cornwall canal. There was a natural depression about a mile back from the rapids, where they might and ought to have located the canal, instead of following close to the stream. But the farmers along the front wanted to have it there, so as to get \$500 each for allowing their farms to be cut. The farmers feasted the contractors and engineers, and, perhaps, gave them a slice of the money. At all events, though I am only a farmer, my eye caught the idea of danger where it has now broken out, and I felt grieved that they should rush into needless danger. It was also said that the Beauharnois canal should have been on the north shore of the St. Lawrence, where it would have been more secure from invasion, but that the owners on the south side managed by judicious expenditure to get the benefit of it on their side of the river. If this is true it was about as bad as anything our present rulers have done."

## PLATONIC FRIENDSHIP.

The Serious Results of a Quarrel and a Charge of Attempted Murder. Paris, Nov. 5. - A notorious artist named Vanbeers, an employee of a banking house and one Hakelberger, were brought before the magistrate charged with using deadly weapons. The quarrel occurred in the bedroom of a woman who had deserted Hakelberger for Vanheers. Hakelberger was wounded in the fight. Hakelberger had left a position in Rothschild's bank and had broken his liaison with a woman whose name is Duvernet, the two agreeing to remain friends. Hakelberger sent the woman an invitation to dinner and was incensed because she ignored the note. He thereupon went to her apartment armed with a revolver and sword stick. The woman accuses him of attempting to murder her. Hakelberger protests he only intended to frighten her, but he is retained in prison.

## ANOTHER GALT TRAGEDY.

#### Heartrending Drowning Calamity on Sa. turday-Two Girls Lose Their Lives.

GALT, Ont., Nov. 5. - A most heartrending drowning accident occurred on Saturday between 12 and 1 o'clock. The three children of Dr. S. F. B. Reid, dentist, two girls and a boy, aged 11, 8 and 5 years, were amusing themselves on the banks of the Grand river. and it is supposed from youthful indiscretion went too near the edge. One of them fell into the river, which at that particular place is deep, and the others, in trying to make a rescue, alse got into the water. Some children on the opposite bank noticed the little boy, the youngest of the children, clinging to the rocks calling for help. The alarm was given, and willing rescuers soon arrived. The boy was saved, but the two girls were drowned.
