

GEN. HARRISON IS SAID TO HAVE SECURED IT.

The Surprise to the Country a Complete One - The Cleveland Boom Not, as Strong as it Was Thought to be-Congress Captured by the Republicans.



GENERAL HARRISON.

NEW YORK, Nov. 7 .- The Tribune this morning says: "The result in this state is not yet certain, but the prospects strongly favor a victory for Harrison and Morton. The plurality for Cleveland below the Harlem river, instead of the 80,000 or 85,000 confidently expected by democrats appears to be only about 70,000. Outside of New York and King's counties the republican gains have thus far been steady, with each additional report of election districts. The proportion of those gains at the hour of writing is such that if continued throughout the state they would ensure the victory of Harrison and Morton electors by a handsome plurality.

NEW YORK, Nov. 7 .- The Times says : "At I a. m. the election returns received by the Times from the interior of the state show diminishing gains for Harrison, and it is by no means certain that the full returns will not altogether destroy the plurality that the early returns indicate for him, and give the state to Cleveland. Connecticut, New Jersey, and Indiana are democratic by safe pluralities, and there is reason to expect that the later returns from Illinois will make that state extremely close, if they do not actually put it in the democratic column.
