THE CROP REPORTS.

The Montreal Gazette is in ecstacies over the publication of Ontario's crop reports, showing, as they do, that the province last year raised more wheat, more barley, more oats, more rye, more peas, more corn, more buckwheat, more beans, more potatoes, more mangel wurzels, more carrots and more turnips than it did in 1887. And this is taken to vindicate the inaccuracy of the reports published some time ago. The Gazette overlooks the fact that the province generally did not suffer at mid summer from drought; that the so-called burnt "dis trict" was practically the Kingston district; that late rains helped the root crop, and late corn and buckwheat grown as a substitute for other fodder, and that the country's outlook for the live stock is much better than it was. Of hay there is a scarcity, and of straw there is none; but these things can be imported from the east and west, where it was never disputed they existed in plenty. That in the Kingston district, i August, the farmers were in a panicky condition is indicated by their great sacrifice of stock, as reported at that time. The improvement in the situation since then is not a matter for which any political party can claim credit.

EXIT CLEVELAND.

Harrison has been elected president of the United States by a safe plurality. In every state he has been a favourite as the gain in the republican vote and the loss in the democratic vote clearly show. It is possible that later and revised figures may give the presidency to Cleveland, but it is very improbable. The republicans have conducted the most spirited and united contest, and the

DIRECT TAXATION.

At the Sherbrook demonstration, held in honour of Hon. J. H. Pope, Sir John Mac donald made a speech in the course of which he said: "Annexation, we must always remember would lead to direct taxation, and if we adopted commercial union or unrestricted reciprocity, which practically means the same thing, we would have to supply our diminished revenue by resorting to direct taxation." It is remarkable that the premier has not discovered any difference between these terms. Some of his organs have been at infinite pains defining the distinction and it has been drawn with a rare regard for the fitness of language. But that is not to the point. Sir John is afraid that the adoption of reciprocity, unlimited and unrestricted, would lead to direct taxation. Is it not remarkable that this thought did not occur to him at an earlier date? He did not think of it in 1878 when, in preparing the way for the national policy, he said he desired a reciprocity of trade between Canada and the United States, but that being impossible he was determined to have a reciprocity of tariffs. He did not think of it again when he had a clause add-Sales | ed to the tariff act of 1879 in favour of reciprocity, and providing for the carrying of it as far as the United States might desire. In truth he did not think of direct taxation at all until the liberals adopted reciprocity in disparagement thereof.

The New York Sun is taking a kindly interest in Sir John Macdonald, and seemingly expects to make a convert of him on the annexation question. It tells him that the burden which now rests upon the people of Canada would be substantially removed by annexation. "That burden," says the Sun, "is the public debt and obligations of

the dominion, and a fearful burden it is, but when the provinces come into the United States, it will all be transferred to the federal government and will then be shared by the sixty millions of people who preall the taxes that would have to be paid by the Canadians would be to provide the comparatively, small sums required for the maintenance of their state and local authorities and for public education and charity, and these sums might be provided either by excise taxes or by taxes on land and other York or Ohio. The Harrison party favours a high tariff because it keeps cheap goods out of the United States, and so improves the position of the workingman. His position would be made much better than it is if not only the cheap goods but cheap labour were kept out of the country.

The tariff question influenced the national election more than it was even expected to do. And Harrison benefited by it in every case. Though both parties were in favour of a reduction of the revenue the republican candidate was the protectionist, and the manufacturers spent a great deal of energy and money in his behalf.

By the republican success in the election of yesterday, and establishment in March of a republican administration, it may be assumed that an end will come to the agitation in favour of commercial union or unrestricted reciprocity. Why so? Hon. Benj. Butterworth, the leader of the movement, is a republican and a protectionist, but he wants free trade between Canada and the United States, and is not likely to cease his labours in that direction now that his own party has succeeded to power.

COLLISION ON THE TRACK.

A Grand Trunk Train And a Kingston & Pembroke Train Have a Collision.

At noon to-day a Kingston & Pembroke railway mixed train collided with a Grand Trunk railway freight train. To the latter was attached a passenger coach. The accident occurred between Princess and Queen streets. The Grand Trunk railway train started out from the city a little ahead of the time it was expected to leave. After passing Princess street the driver heard the Kingston & Pembroke railway train coming, stopped his train and awaited the result The K. & P. RR. came along at a pretty rapid rate with the engine behind. Owing to a bend in the track the men on the train could not see the G. T. R. train until they were close upon it. The brakesmen did all they could to lessen the force of the collision. When the trains met a K. & P. RR. baggage car was broken by the tender of the G.T.R. locomotive. The brakesmen jumped in various directions to escape being killed. The passengers on the K. & P. RR. coach were thrown against each other. Two ladies fainted. The coach was injured. The G.T.R. train was not badly damaged. The tender was, broken and part of a flat car destroyed.

PULPIT SENSATION.

Rev. Mr. Jeffrey Not Himself At All -Remarkable Assertions.

TORONTO, Nev. 6.—On Sunday morning Rev. Mr. Jeffrey preached a remarkable sermon. Among other things he said;

"You have no right to tolerate sin in your minister. I speak with an intensity of purpose. But you say, 'Brother, you should draw it mild. (Laughter.) I suppose Jesus Christ was very mild when He denounced the religious professors of His day as Generation of vipers, how shall ye escape the damnation of hell?' I tell you some of you are too mealy mouthed. What is the reason? You know you are not living right. Tell the truth and shame the devil. Some of you are 'terrors' on a pipe and tobacco smokers. (Laughter.) You may lie, steal, break the Sabbath and you say that will all be forgiven, but if your brother smokes you tell him he will not go to heaven. The sight of a pipe has just the same effect on you as a red rag on a bull. (Applause) There's many a smoking man will get to heaven, while some of you nonsmokers will knock at the door a long time and then not get in. Some mothers think their daughters will not get into heaven if their daughters wear the Grenadier style of bonnet and feathers. ()thers are just as strong against flounces. (Laughter.) It is astonishing how pietists dive first at one thing and then at another. You condemn smoking because you durst not smoke a pipe to save your life. (Laughter.) But you can do something else a great deal worse. Can a man who plays cards go to heaven? Yes, he can. Can a man who drinks whiskey go to heaven? Yes, he can."

An interruptor-"No, he can't." Mr. Jeffrey-"This is another gospel! man who habitually gets drunk cannot, as a drunkard, go to heaven, but I defy any one kidneys.
