And in the face of such matrimonial alliances people will ask, "Is Marriage a Failure ?" Can it be anything else in the majority of these cases ? That men and women, possessing the common sense and grace with which nature and providence have endowed them, should commit the consummate folly of marrying by contract passes understanding. If they read at all, and made themselves conversant with the history of the times as enbraced in the everyday incidents recorded by the newspapers, they would have known that the wedded union of people who had not the opportunity to understand each other before joining hands, has been fraught with disaster. The divorce courts are being crowded with business, and the number of them is being annually increased. The facilities for breaking the marriage contract are such that less concern is felt about the consequences of error in the selection of a wife or a husband. The easier the means of obtaining divorce the greater the indifference to the nature of the marriage that precedes it. Marriage in short is being reduced to the level of a business partnership, which is given a trial and dissolved if it is not a success. Last year's divorce record in the United States was appalling in its proportions. This year's will be even more appalling. It can not be otherwise so long as such a condition of things exists as the announcement from New York indicates.

A CONTRAST.

The London Free Press, with the view apparently of extolling the name of its political master, Hon. John Carling, has a lengthy puff of the dominion government's experimental farms. It is announced that from them 200 varieties of cereals were shown at the late fairs, that on them 200 varieties of seedling potatoes were raised from hybridized seeds, that some new varieties of grapes and small fruits were produced, that 75,000 young trees from seed were planted in the North-West Territories, trees native to the country, and of a kind which the promoters know will stand the climate. And then the article continues :

"The agencies under the administration of Hon. Mr. Carling are devoted to the real practical objects of farming, leaving the book teaching to others. And this idea we believe, will meet with approval from the large class who are specially interested. Had Mr. Carling been allowed to go on with what he had in view when the Mimico land | Hamilton Times. was purchased we should long since have had the important practical results that are now coming forward, rather than the confused work of 'bookish theories' such as has been seen.

This is as near a reflection upon the Guelph farm, under the direction of the Ontario government, as it is possible to come. The idea is that while the dominion farms are practical that of the province is theoretioal, "bookish." And is this the distinctive characteristic of them ? Is it a fair experience to either or both? The Free Press knows that the Guelph farm is not a mere experimental station, that it does not aim at the production of some new variety of fruit or vegetable merely, that it is a college in truth as in name and gives to its students the highest and most valuable agricultural education which it is possible to secure. Its training in necessarily "bookish" to some extent, and a training in the sciences pertaining to agriculture is not of much account if it can be got without books. The professors at the Guelph farm have not sought to advertise it or themselves by showing at the fairs what "they" can produce. They have

studying directly under them. On the contrary they have been issuing, at regular intervals, bulletins dealing with questions of interest to every farmer, and in a way calculated to show that they have an experimental knowledge of the same. The dominion agencies have been sending out similar bulletins, and in humble imitation of the Guelph college whose merits the tory press would like to depreciate. Most important of all the Guelph college is designed to graduate men qualified to become educators in turn and to benefit the country by their service. It is fulfilling the object for which it was established. It is equipping a class by whom agriculture will be made more popular, more profitable, and in keeping with the grand resources of this province.
