BOSTON MASSACRE.


CELEBRATED BY THE UNVEILING OF A MONUMENT.

An Occurrence of a Century Ago-A Picture of Where the Terrible Event Hapened - An Incident That Served to the People Discontented With the Rule They Had.

One hundred and eighteen years age on the h of March pext was shed the first blood in the conflict of the colonies of America with the mother country. Five colonists were at that time killed in an encounter with British troops. More than a century after the work these rebels began was finished the people of Boston have united in erecting a monumeus to their memory, and in commemoration of the beginning of a struggle which ended with

the independence of the colonies. Two British regiments had in 1768 been quartered on the people of Boston. The colonists were already much excited over the anpopular stamp act and were in no mood to tolerate the presence of soldiers.

The beginning of the affair was unimportant. A soldier was strolling by a ropewalk, and unluckily got into a row with the some other "redcoats," and together they



ROBERT KRAUS. thrashed the ropemakers and drove them through the streets. A crowd of citizens collected in the afternoon bent on vengeance on the soldiers; but it was Friday, and in two days it would be Sunday, and no Bostonian in that day would begin a work for the finishing of which there was not plenty of time before the Sabbath. They were bent on hammering the soldiers, but not on Sunday. So they waited till Sunday had passed, nursing their wrath in the meantime. The next day, after having religiously attended divine worship, they reassembled. They went at it early. Between 6 and 7 o'clock in the morning several hundred men, armed with all kinds of impla ments, assembled in Kings (now State) street, shouting that they would drive out the soldiers. Two bours after they attacked some soldiers in Dock square. There was a good deal of shouting and crying of fire and tearing up of property; the citizens poured into the streets; the town was in a commotion. This continued through the day, and before midnight the din of shouting, ringing of bells and rattle of musketry were a per-

fect bedlam. Finally, as matters were quieting down, a tall man, Mephistopheles like, in a white wig and a scarlet cloak, suddenly appeared on the scene and commenced to harangue the crowd, concluding his remarks with the words, "To the main guard!" The words were re-echoed by his listeners, and dividing in three divisions they went by different routes to the main guard. One of the divisions passing the custom house attacked a sentinel on post. He called on the main guard for protection, and Capt. Preston, the officer of the day, sent him eight men with unloaded muskets.

Attucks, who was at the head of a party of sailors (who were pelting the soldiers unmercifully), shouted to his followers to atthem to fire, the most against the plined soldiers refrained from firing without orders.

A mulatto named

Attucks and the UMENT. sailors, cheering, knocked the muskets with their clubs and shouted to the mob to "come on." Meanwhile Capt. Preston came on the ground and endeavored to quiet matters. Attucks aimed a blow at his head, which the captain parried with his arm. The weapon felled a soldier, and Attucks seized his bayonet. At that juncture voices behind Capt. Preston shouted, "Why don't you fire?" soldier struggling with Attucks, supposing it to be an order, shot Attucks dead. Five other soldiers fired at intervals. Three citizens were killed, five wounded, and a few others slightly hurt. Crispus Attucks, Samnel Gray and James Caldwell were killed outright. Samuel Miverick and Patrick

Car received mortal wounds. Boston was soon quieted down, but the "Boston massacre" became a horror throughout the colonies and went far to deepen the discontent with British rule.

It is in celebration of this event, and particularly of the part taken by Attucks, that the monument recently unveiled in Boston

and here figured has been erected. The monument was designed by Robert Kraus, of Boston. It is of Concord granite, 24 feet 4 inches high. On the face of the pedestal is a bas relief representing the ceiebrated "massacre." In the foreground & seen the body of Attucks. In the center is represented the old state house, and bekind it the brick First church. Above the bar relief stands a statue of "Free America." at her side an eagle ready to fly. At the book the shaft is a band of thirteen stars, beareth which is inscribed the names of the fire vice Below the bas relief is the date all the
