sent to gaol because he has not been able to satisfy the men who invested money in his scheme that there is anything in it, that the motor is of any mechanical and monetary value whatever. He has been working at an idea for years developing the theory that a thimblefull of water and a little suppressed air, can generate power enough to move collosal weights-and he has got no nearer success than the man who is seeking perpetual motion. The last order issued by the court in the case was that Mr. Keely should supply drawings and specifications of sufficient size and clearners to give the stockholders a conception of the motor's merits. He failed to do it, and has been committed. He will remain in custody un' til he has purged himself of contempt, and legally discharged every obligation for which the court holds him. This will probably hasten matters. It will certainly dispose of the suspicion that Keely is imposing upon the capitalists. If he has an article worth anything he will now exercise his inventive faculties and finish it. The longer he lingers about his work the longer he languishes in gaol.

GROWING IN POPULARITY.

General Boulanger is growing in popularity. The fact cannot be gainsaid. The republican papers have been trying to make the people believe that his star is setting, that it will soon have passed out of the political firmanent. But it's all a delusion. Boulanger has established himself in the affections of the people. He is their ideal of a soldier, a man of dash, of display, of warlike professions. He has been the bete noir of the government ever since he was replaced in the war office. He was too aggressive for and yet he rises, is elected to the deputies from half a dozen departments, makes the great public heart throb by his words, however few in number, and is altogether such a power in the land as to imperil the existence of this government or of any go vernment of which he is not a member. It is a question, indeed, if he will now accept any public position short of the presidency of the republic. It looks as if that were the aim of his aspirations. He is feared, and as the only way of avoiding a crash on his account-for the French are very sudden of action-it is proposed to expel him. But for what offence? That's the rub. He is personally giving no offence. He is the inspiration of the Boulanger demonstrations, though he is not directly involved in them. He is carefully watched, however, for evidence of any act that can justify his expulsion. It looks as if history is repeating itself France. Napoleon's example may be suggestive to Boulanger. The early experience of the one may be the experience of the other.

WHO MADE THE LAW!

Surprise has been expressed that Hon. Mr. Blake would declare, before the Supreme court, that the Red River railway cannot cross the Canada Pacific railway or any of its branches without an act of parliament. That, Mr. Blake contends, is the law, though he does not say it is a just law. The raising of the point is not discreditable. to him. It does not at all effect the arguments he used against the monopolistic tendencies of the railway syndicate while yet he acted as the leader of the opposition. He is not responsible for the loose railway legislation of the Dominion parliament. He had nothing to do with the drafting of it. His suggestions in regard to it were not appreciated nor acted upon.
