

A RECORD OF HIS CRIMES. Here is a record of some of the crimes of

vear ago in November a man was arrested on the banks of the Seine for robbery. He wounded a policeman, who made the arrest, with a revolver. He gave his name as Prado y Ribo. He was really Linsk de Castillon. He had previously gone by three other names-Mendoza, Hero and Grasset. In 1837 he was married in Madrid, i. e. married the last time, for he had often been married before. He then registered himself as Linsk de Castillon. This name is also on the certificate of the birth of his child, whose mother was a woman named Couronneau. who lives at Bordeaux.

alias two or three other persons, is the son of Louis Napoleon by a lady in waiting at the French court. At any rate be was born in 1855, when Napoleon was at the height of his power. When the lad was 13 years old he was placed at school at Dijon and was under the care of an old lady who had plenty of money. His first piece of handiwork was robbing his mother of all her jewels, and then skipping. He went around the world to see what was going on, landing at San Francisco, and at last bringing up in New York. In 1372 he held a commission as lieutenant in the Carlist army. He secured a brief leave of absence. It was very brief, but not so short as to deprive him from crossing the frontier into France and effecting a robbery of 8,000 francs. Singularly enough hadid not forget to return. He rejoined the army, and at the siege of San Sebastian, was taken prisoner and sentenced to be shot, but the daughter of the governor, whom he had seduced, saved his life.

WOUNDED AS A SOLDIER. At the battle of Sommorostro he was wounded and taken to a hospital, where he seduced a Sister of Charity who nursed him. He afterwards married her and went on a tour with her to the Holy Land. His wife died at Ischin, and it is believed that he poisoned her. He then went to Sarona, where, in broad day light, he stole 30,000 francs worth of jewelry. He disposed of the jewels and returned to France.

Prado took part in the last Carlist war, and then concluded to make a tour to Peru. The country proved a gold mine to him, for he married a woman who brought him 1,200,-000 francs. He had a child by her who died young, and his wife, as was usually with those he married, died suddenly. On the day and her relatives were so scandalized that they drove him out of Lima.

IN MADRID AS A GAMBLER. Then he opened a gambling house in Madrid, and won 200,000 francs in one night by cheating at roulette. There a Spanish marchioness over 80, to whom he made love, furnished him with 80,000 francs. On Nov. 1, 1879, he married a Spanish lady at San Sebastian, Dolores Garces y Mancilla, who brought him 170,000 francs. This wife is still living in Madrid in poverty.

He next went to Paris-in 1883-where he continued his rascalities, and lived with a married wo man (Mme. Varlay), who was separated from her husband. She was desperately in love with Prado, and gave him all her money. It was at this time that the murder of Marie Aquetant occurred.

This woman was of the demi-monde of Paris. She owned splendid jewels, which she displayed to Prado. One night Prado went with her to her room, and the next morning at 4 o'clock she was discovered to have been murdered. Her money and her jewels had disappeared. Prado went homo to Mme. Varlay the same night, but did not sleep, continually getting up to wash his hands. Mme. Varlay also noticed that he had been scratched. Prado told her that a woman had been murdered in Paris and every one was discussing it. At the time he alone knew of the murder. His shirt also was bloody. He burned his shirt and his boots, notwithstanding the remonstrance of Mme. Varlay. They dined together that afternoon, and Prado spoke of the murder carelessly. But soon after he told her he was going to Spain. She saw him off, and on reading the description of the man who was last seen with Marie Aquetant, was horrified to see that it described her lover. GOING BACK TO PARIS.

Mme. Variay heard from Prado afterward. He wrote her to join him and go with him to America. After other escapades in Spain, Prado returned to Paris and robbed a jeweler of 10,000 francs. It was for this act that he was arrested.

PRADO ON TRIAL.

Prado's conduct at the trial surpassed the most sanguine expectations of his admirers, and threw Prazini's celebrated "premiere" completely into the shade. Professors in psychology all agree that in him is revealed, in addition to a most murderous monster, a wonderful specimen of that human prodnet so much discussed here of late, namely, "L'Homme a Femme,"

Physically, every one of his features is repulsive.

Indeed, a mere glance at him is sufficient to engender a feeling of loathing. But when he opens his lips and speaks he is totally metamorphosed. He becomes absolutely attractive. His whole face lights up, and even the judge, who, clothed in red and black, sits under the picture of the crucifixion, is moved to admiration, as well as the perfumed mondaines and demi-mondaines who throng the court room.

Prado's antecedents are mysterious, and have hitherto baffled the most diligent efforts of the French police to determine his etat civil. It is only when he speaks such perfect Spanish, French or English, as he does every now and theu, that doubts arise as to his beir g a Frenchman.
