RATHBUN'S TACTICS.

The great objection some people have to the N. T. & Q. railway is that Mr. E. W. Rathbun is its manager, and that he will do all he can, if the Yarker Harrowsmith connection be made, to divert trade from this city to Deseronto. Now that Mr. Rathbun is interested in the welfare of the little town | K. & S. F. railway are saying that if one in which he lives goes without saying, but that he does not use his position as a railway man to the disadvantage of other places is found by experience. He has been in strumental in connecting Gananoque and Campbellford by railway with the trunk system, and the reeves of these places will not say that he has discriminated against the villages, that he has diverted trade from them, and so done them an injury. On the contrary he has been exceedingly obliging in his railway service, and has conferred large benefits thereby upon the people.

Nor is Mr. Rathbun seeking to consolidate his immense business in Deseronto as his oppenents have alleged. He has a saw mill opposite to Belleville, a mill at Campbellford, cement works at Napance, and two mills on the Ottawa and near the capital, and by these, to say nothing of the railway hands and the officers and attendants at the several lumber offices, he employs fully five hundred persons. And does the product of all the industries, among these most important in the country, go to Deseronto for shipment? Certainly not. The less handling freight receives, the cheaper its transportation, and the lumber and ties that come here now will continue to come, and the better the facilities the larger the quantities.

It may not be necessary to correct one falacy in which Ald. C. Robinson has indulged, but lest someone in attendance at the Rideau ward meeting held on Friday evening, was carried away by his eloquence, we touch upon it. He gave the people to under stand that Mr. Rathbun had imposed upon the Napanee ratepayers, that he solicited a bonus of \$30,000 from them and then failed to do as the voters had expected, that is he promised not to build a line to Deseronto and did the next thing to it, constructed a line to Deseronto junction. And all this was represented as a part of the N. I. & Q. railway scheme. Now, to put it mildly, this statement is not based on fact. Mr. Rathbun did not solicit the Napanee people for a bonus, and did not deceive them in regard to the Buy of Quinte (or Deseronto) railway. Indeed the Deseronto branch was built before the Napanee people voted the bonus to the N. T. & Q. railway, and the alleged deception could not be practiced apon them. Moreover Mr. Bathbun did connection, and so far as it can be ascer- future owners or lesses of the road. tained he carried out his contract to the very letter.

Thus one by one the fictions of Mr. Rathbun's maligners are being ruthlessly ruined.

THE VOTING TO MORROW. To-morrow the electors—that is the real estate owners and lessees of property for the period to be covered by the bonus bylaws will decide the question of paramount importance, namely, shall Kingston be progressive and enterprising? The opportunity to increase the wealth and trade of the city, to stimulate its growth and add to its popution, does not present itself every day. There is, it is said, a tide in the affairs of men, which taken at the full leads to fortune; and there is a tide in the affairs of towns and cities which taken at the full leads to prosperity. That tide, so far as Kingston is concerned, is now about to flow, Ottawa Journal. and the people should not only not obstruct its passage but remove everything from its way, so letting it run freely and carry with it the commerce which is so essential to the

public welfare. There are seven points which the electors should bear in mind: (I) That the schemes are the best of the kind that can be presented; (2) that the Kingston & Smith's Falls railway has the general support of ratepayers and property owners; (3) that the N. Grand Trunk will not make a new departure? Simply because it is moved to enterprise by the action of competing lines. It was only when another railway, the Canada Pacific, had a convenient city station and connection through the Kingston & Pem broke that it put on a suburban train and secured a city passenger station. It is only when the citizens were awakened to the importance of making this a great railway centre that the Grand Trunk management decides to do something definite upon a scheme of long contemplation. The Grand Trunk men are not understood to be offering any opposition to the bonus by-laws upon which the people vote to-morrow. That they are now so eager about the building of the loop line and the removal here of the workshops, however, makes one suspect their motives, They have no reason to suppose that the city will not be favourable to any movement which means the location here of between 2,000 and 2,300 people, and certainly no reason to suppose, as one person has put it, that the city will, in an ill-advised moment, grasp at the shadow and abandon the substance. Whatever their desires and intentions this has been one effect of Messrs. Stevenson and Wainwright's visit-that the opponents of the N. & T. railway and the scheme carries the others cannot, that the city cannot afford to give bonuses to all, They do not know apparently that this city is financially in a better position than ever it was to assist railway enterprises. It can help the Grand Trunk as it proposes to help the competing companies, but it may never be called upon to do so if the by laws are voted down to-morrow. The Grand Trunk will be guided in this connection by circumstances. It will do all its management suggests if it cannot do otherwise, and will not do anything very suddenly if the prospects of the N. & T. and K. & S. F. railways are not particularly promising. These further facts should be borne in mind: That few of the opponents of the railway by-laws are actuated by other than personal motives; that the great objectors are allowing petty grievances to prejudice their action; that they have not an eye single to the good of the city; that they will not permit themselves to be convinced of their error. One significant result of the agitation has already become apparent. Property, especially in the outer wards, has been raised in value. Thousands of dollars of it have been bought up, and in the expectation of its worth being increased by the railway schemes. This is only a foretaste of the benefits that will follow the passage of the bonus by-laws. The boom the city now feels will be kept up, and every one will be favourably influenced by it.



CORDWOOD AGREEMENT.

THIS INDENTURE made the Twenty. fourth day of November, One Thousand Eight Hundred and Eighty eight between the Napanee, Tamworth & Quebec Railway Company, bereinafter called the Company of the first part, and the Corporation of the City of Kingston, hereinafter called the Corporation of the second part :

WHEREAS a By law has passed its second reading in the Council of the Corporation of the City of Kingston, for the purpose of granting a bonus of seventy five thousand dollars to the Company, and will be veted on by the ratepayers of the said City on the Twenty-ninth day of November instant :

AND WHEREAS in the discussion on the advisability of the ratepayers giving their assent to said By law, it has been represented that it would be an additional consideration and advantage for them so to do if the Company would enter into the covenant and agreement, hereinafter contained, in relation to the carrying of cordwood in addition to the other agreements and conditions to be entered into by the Company in pursuance of the said By-law.

Now this indenture witnesses that in consideration of the sum of one dollar, and of the assenting to the said By law by the said ratepayers and the passing of the same by said Council,

The company hereby covenants and agrees to and with the said corporation that they will, at all times, carry cordwood to the City of Kingston from Tweed or any point between Tweed and Harrowsmith and the City of Kingston, at a rate not to exceed \$9 per car, for each car carrying six cords of dry hardwood, or twelve tons of green or

soft or wet cordwood ;

Also that the said covenant, herein contained, shall be inserted in the deed to be executed between the Company and Corporation under the provisions of the said By-law, this agreement to bind all Successors, Lessees, Assigns or Companies wi.h which the Company may be amalgamated or become a part. It is also hereby understood and agreed that in case the said By law should not receive the assent of the said latepayers that then this indenture is to be void and of no effect.
