In order to be rid of such visitations Mr. Laughlin removed with his family to Toronto, where they had comparative quiet, and eventually, about twenty five years ago, came here, where he worked at his trade, that of carpenter. A FRACAS WITH THE POLICE.

A Negro Holiday Making Disturbed-A Serious Conflict With the Police.

SAVANNAH, Ga., Nov. 30. -An attempt part of the city yesterday afternoon resulted. Two policemen and a white man who went to their aid were seriously injured and several negroes wounded. Patrolman Mc-Murray, in dispersing the crowd, was set upon and knocked down. The crowd closed in upon him, but he got up, and finding his club useless drew his revolver and began firing. The quarter of the city where the trouble began is inhabited wholly by negroes, and being a holiday most of them were on the streets. The report of the shooting attracted a crowd, and in five minutes 500 people were around the officer, who was fighting at a disadvantage. Other officers heard the shooting and hastened to the place, but the crowd saw them coming and attacked Patrolman Cronan and knock ed him down, fracturing his skull. McMurray was driven three or four blocks down the street and escaped into a house, but the crowd broke through the windows and threw him into the street, where the negro women beat him with bricks until insensible. The police were notified at headquarters, and a squad of mounted officers soon arrived. By this time 1,000 negroes were in the street yelling and crying "Kill them," "Kill them." The police held the crowd back, and eight of the ringleaders were arrested. The crowd was finally dispersed, but mounted police were kept on duty in the vicinity all day in fear of a fresh outbreak. At night a negro with seven bullet wounds in his body was found dead in the part of the city where the shooting occurred, and it is shot. The negroes are greatly excited, but the police do not fear any further trouble.

THE TIMES' QUEER REASONING.

The Cuiting Down of the Tory Majority Means Nothing to That Paper.

NEW YORK, Nov. 30. -The Times' London despatch says that although Lord Compton cuts down the tory majority in Holborn by 600, the failure of the liberals to carry the seat will be gloomily received. Under ordinary circumstances such a large reduction of the hostile majority would be viewed as a practical Gladstonian victory, but the liberal candidate was personally so superior to his opponent, and made his canvass on such broad grounds that his defeat by any majority at all is a blow to the party progress. The lesson of the election is that London has not changed its mind on the Irish question.
