A Member of the Imperial Parliament Asked to Withdraw-Cause Given. LONDON, Dec. 1.-In the house of commons to-day the speaker ordered Mr. Cunningham E. Graham, advanced liberal member for the north west division of Lanark shire, to withdraw from the house because he had accused Mr. Smith, the government leader, of conviving at a dishonorable trick, and had refused to retract the accusation. As Mr. Graham was leaving the house member shouted, "Bravo Graham." In an interview Mr. Graham explained that the trouble arose over the action of Mr. Brooke Robinson, conservative member for Dudley, in putting a motion on the paper to prevent discussion on the chainmakers' grievances. Mr. Graham had characterized this as a dishonorable trick, and had expressed the belief that the government had instigated Mr. Robinson to perform it.
