

In the opinion of his opponents he should accept the inevitable gracefully, but that is a question about which feeling will fluctuate according to the exigency of political parties. The reduction of the tariff was advocated by the democrats as a necessity, however, and their defeat did not make it less felt on one day than another. The surplus millions remain in the treasury, they are growing larger and larger annually, becoming burdensome to carry and embarrassing to business generally by the withdrawal of such large sums from their ordinary channels. A truth emphasized on Nov. 4th can be safely emphasized now, and this President Cleveland does. The republicans won't have it, and think it little short of impertinent to reflect upon what they say "the people have decided." Perhaps Mr. Cleveland is cognizant of the fact that while the electoral college gives the presidency to Mr. Harrison, a majority of the electors at large voted his ticket and must be assumed to be in accord with his sentiments. However that may be he is making the closing days of his official term very interesting. He will eventually disappear from the White House, but not in a blaze of glory.

OUR CRIMINALS.

In Chicago, in an address on "Prison Reform," ex-President Hayes deprecated the practice so generally followed by the municipal authorities, which gives to well-known criminals the virtual freedom of the cities wherein they may live. It is only the act in which they may be caught, or which may be fastened upon them, which he says will bring them within the clutches of the law. Meanwhile they are permitted to roam at large. And there is no doubt that during this period they do damage which cannot become known to the police authorities. Mr. Hayes urges that the place for confirmed criminals is the penitentiary during his life. At large they will at every opportunity gratify the propensity for a particular vicious. ness. This argument has in Kingston been exemplified in the case of the Indian Jackson, who, as soon as he left the institution in which he had been so long incarcerated, resume his burglaries and his thefts and is prepared to commit murder in connection with them. Mr. Hayes' idea, so far as he is concerned, and all like him, is the correct one. The chance to prolong a criminal career should not be presented. The point which Mr. Hayes did not make plain, nowever, was this-that the possibility of re stituency, had coerced their mortgagors to Barr, Rochester-failed to steal a base dur. form in every one must not be overlooked, and that without restoration to his liberty, without contact with the people, without being submitted to the test of honesty, there is no telling what a man can become. There are, of course, some who do not desire to return to respectable society, who have no ambition to lift themselves once they have fallen, or who are naturally given to offence, have a penchant for it. Of these it is manifestly the duty of the state in some way to take care. "This telegram," says Mr. Bond in his letter to the press, "was sent in reply to a message from Sir William, after Mr. Morine had denied the charge. The offer was made about the 10th of October, after Mr. Morine had left our party, because, as he alleges, of our want of principle. Sir William Whiteway spurned Mr. Morine and his bribe, and as a result the latter has left nothing undone to injure him and his party. Mr. Morine played his last card, and finding that the game was lost to him, he gave reins to passion and maligned his benefactor and his political supporters. To meet the second denial, as to his being a paid agent of Sir Charles Tupper, I called upon Messrs. Whiteway and Johnston to prove that they had cashed a draft for him to the value of \$200 drawn by Sir Charles Tupper in Montreal. Mr. Morine declares that the resolution adopted by the Whiteway party on the 1st September, was the 'resolution which actually stopped the delegation to Ottawa.' If such be the case I am convinced that even the most ardent confederates will applaud my action, now that they are enlightened as to the scheme contemplated and mode of action."

The revelation is certainly very interesting. It is more than interesting; it is most damaging to the confederation scheme. The union promoted by a lot of boodling wirepullers will not be acceptable to the people now, and it may be sometime before a new set of leaders, more above suspicion, can be encouraged to take hold of it and carry it to success.

RECIPROCITY IN WRECKING.




