A THEFT IN THE U. S. TREASURY.

Ten sheets of \$5 Notes Taken Before Being Stan: ped with the Official Scal.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8. - Another irregularity has been discovered in the Treasury De partment, arising out of the mysterious dis Graphic, London News, Holly Leaves, Yule Tide, Pictorial World, Ladies' Pictorial at 50c. appearance of ten sheets of paper, each con taining four notes of the denomination of \$5 and representing \$200 in all. These sheets were included in the regular delivery from the Bureau of Engraving and Printing to the United States Treasurer on Tuesday morn ing last. The packages were counted and reported to be correct in every particular Such as Boy's Own, Girl's Own, Sunday at Home, Lei ure Hour, Chatterbox, etc., have before leaving the bureau. On reaching the Treasurer's office they were again counted and reported correct. The notes are all completed with the exception of being stamped with the Treasury seal, and when that is added, are ready for issue. After the packages had been verified at the Treasurer's office they were turned over to the scaling division for completion. They were counted. there and found to be short ten sheets. These were numbered in regular order, and were in the middle of a package. The officer in charge of the division refused to receipt for these sheets, and word was sent to the bureau for an explanation. A thorough investigation was instituted, and though days have passed, whatever of the missing sheets has While it is possible been discovered. that the sheets were mislaid and may be recovered, it is more than probable that they were abstracted by some one thoroughly familiar with the method of handling them: The notes will readily pass current for

seal to be legal tender. THE ALASKA SCANDAL.

Lieut. Whelem Says the Reports are Fully Justified by the facts.

PITTSBURG, Dec. 8 .- That the Alaska outrages have not been one whit overdrawn, but are, on the contrary, rather underestimated, has been vo ched for by Lieut. (H. Whelem, a well-known gentleman of this city, who in the years 1879 and 1880 was engaged in northern whaling expeditions, and in 1881 passed a winter of terror in an effort to make the northwest passage. Lieut. Whelem says that his last experiences there were by far the worst, and that it was owing entirely to the introduction among the native men and women of whalers, Alaska fur company agents, and their accompaniments of vile tobacco and still viler whiskey.

"The natives," said he, "live like animals and there is nothing known between them and the fur agents and their employes except sociability in its worst sense. Al published reports about the conditions there are true, and it is impossible to overdraw the degrading picture. During the winter months they actually live in holes in the ground, not in families separately, but in a disgusting pell-mell way that cannot even be imagined, much less described. In the summer months of July, August, and September affairs are even worse as far as the foreign element is concerned, for it is then that the able-bodied men go out on long hunting expeditions, and the women are completely at the mercy of the Government employes and the men belonging to the fur companies.

HOT - MILK - SHAKE, "As for the Government people, in the southern portions they are practically non est. 'There is no government there, except that of the seal monopoly, and the reason can easily be seen. The natives are wild for the possession of whisky and tobacco and company that supplies them, and for this reason they hold the ruling hand. The marriage relation there is entirely unknown, and, as far as morality is concerned, it is unheard of. Will you believe me when I give this one instance that came under my own personal observation :

"We had been lying off Point Barrow, and I was on shore with an Englishman stationed there. The native, after a good deal of haggling over the price of whisky and tobacco, sold his wife for a certain length of time. I heard most appalling tales from the shipmen in regard to the cruelties practiced by the fur people and the Government employes, many of whom are not one whit better. The company has virtually enslaved the women through its employes."
