

The central figure shows a semi-long glove in some light shade, cut up at the edge in two deep vandykes, which are bordered with a few rows of gold braid and filled in with a frilling of lace, plain or beaded. The remaining figure is a kid glove borderey with a band of raised embroidery or bead work. It is edged on both sides by a gimp vandyke.

#### New Things for Underclothing.

The newest under petticoats are made of shot silk with pinked out flounces and black satin, quilted in colors. Flannel petticoats have thick satin stitch embroidery, to the depth of a quarter of a yard, and when made of colored flannel white flannel flounces are intermixed with the colored. Chemises are made with very full and wide double frills of lace turning downwards from the neck, full in front with ribbon run through the insertion; batiste and real Valenciennes are the materials most used in Paris.
