A UNION WITH CANADA.

Mr. Butterwoath's Resolution in the U.S. Senate-What Its Import Is.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13. -Mr. Butterworth, Ohio, has introduced for reference the following joint resolution, authorizing the premision to possimic with reference to the unity and assimilation with the United States of the Dominion of Canada, or of one or more of the provinces thereof :

"Whereas the citizens of the Dominion of Canada are one with us in race, lineage, history and tradition ;

"And whereas the resources of the two countries supplement each other, and the arteries of commerce, both natural and artificial, are so interlocked and mutually dependent upon each other that they ought to constitute a single system, to be one and inseparable; "And whereas the commercial relations

between the United States and the Dominion of Canada are and have been strained and unnaturally cramped, and in a measure paralyzed, owing to the inability of the two governments to establish such system of international trade and commerce between them as essential to meet the requirements of the situation;

"And whereas the conditions and relations before referred to, as also the geography of the two countries suggest, the impossibility of a just and permanent settle ment of the controversies pertaining to the fisheries, boundaries and transcontinental trade, except by blending of interests under one governmental system, and point logically to the necessity and probability of a unity and assimilation between the two nations under one government;

Whereas, the bonds of sympathy resulting from kinship, race, language, tradition, and substantial identity of governmental systems, together with a community of inter ests based upon commerce and its aids and agencies, are of such a character that such a union and assimiliation is being discussed, and favorably considered by the citizens of looth nations; and inasmuch as it is believed that its early consummation would be of great advantage to all the citizens and subjects of two countries, provided the same can be attached in a manner consistent alike with honor and dignity of the United States and Great Britain and dominion of

Canada: Therefor, with a view to aid in the consummation of what is hereintofore suggested, be it resolved by the senate and house of representatives of the United States, in congress assembled, that the president be and is hereby authorized, and empowered to invite negotiations looking to the assimiliation and unity of the people of the Dominion of Canada and the United States under one government, such unity and dissimila tion to be based upon the admission of several provinces of the Dominion, or any one of them, into union of states, upon the same terms and equality with the several states now composing the union, and the assumption by the United States of the indebtedness of the Daminion of Canada, or just proportion thereof, and such other equitable terms and conditions as justice to the high contracting parties may demand.

And resolved, further, that with a view to such negotiations the president invite the appointment of commissioners by the government of Great Britain and Dominion of Canada to consider the wisdom and expediency of settling and adjusting all controversies and differences which now exist between the two governments growing out of the fisheries or other otherwise, by such union and assimilation as is herein before suggested, either as to the whole or any province or several provinces of said dominion, such negotiations to be conducted with rested yesterday on complaint of his mother, due regard to the amicable relations which obtain between Great Britain and the Unit-

A VERY PECULIAR CASE.

HAS THE BOY BEEN REALLY BIT-TEN BY A DEAD DOG.

Acts Like a Dog-in Outrage Committed By the Dog Catchers of Philadelphia-A Case the Authorities Should Look Into.

Sr. Louis, Mo. Dec. 12. - A story of outrage has come to fight which excites the strongest indignation. On North Broadway lives Mrs. Maggie Maier, widow, who has two little boys, Willie, aged 13 years, and Freddie, aged 8. Willie is now a pitiabl sufferer from horrible spasms, and will be either a cripple for life or insane,

His cordition is the result of an outrage committed by dog catchers in the employ of the city. It is the business of these men to go about the streets and catch all the unlicensed dogs they can find. October 13 the the little Maier boys went to school, and when dismissed they started home.

Near Bleventh and O' harlon streets than they came upon a large crowd of boys. The dog catchers were chasing a dog and crowd of boys. The Maier boys also chased the dog. The dog catchers gave up the chase after the dog, and, turning around with the wires in their hands, ran after the crowd. . Willie Mair ran east, and into a yard in the rear of St. Ann's asylum.

He was pursued by one of the dog catch. ers, who, throwing the wire over his head, caught him about the neck and pulled him to where the waggon stood. He was then thrown into the waggon. This, however, the boy says he cannot remember, for his eyes were blinded and he was entirely out of his head from fright.

The brother, seeing the fate of his older brother, ran home and informed his mother that the dog catchers had Willie. The mother went to the police station at Seventh and Carr and told the officers what had happened, and she says she was told to go home and attend to her work. The boy reached home in a dazed condition and complained of his head aching and his eyes being dazed. The mark of the wire about the neck was also visible.

The mother put her boy to bed, thinking that he had only been frightened, and that the next day he would be all right. The next day came and he grew worse, and so on until the 16th when he began trembling. His entire head, body, arms, hands and legs were continually shaking.

This was kept up until the 20th, when he was suddenly seized with a fit. In this f. the boy would display all the movements of a dog, lying on the floor, barking and snap ping at every one. These fits he would have from two to seven a day, and from the 20th of October up to the present time has had them regularly. While in one of these fits, jumping and rolling on the floor, he wants to have something in his teeth.

At first the mother refused to give him her dress or apron, and the result of this was that, for many hours after getting over one of these fits he could not open his mouth. When the mother became aware of this she always gave him her skirt or her apron to bite at. This he does like a dog. All his movements are like those of a dog. At night the mother states that when in bed he bundles himself up like a little dog. It is thought that he must have been bitten by one of the dogs, as he gives evidence of suffering from hydraphobia. The boy is taking medicine, but it ap-

pears to have no effect on him whatever, and his death is believed to be inevitable.

He Will See to the Spiritual Needs of the

Italians in America. Rome, Dec. 13. - The Osservatoire Romano publishes the pope's letter to the bishops in America with reference to the care of Italian immigrants. This letter says: "The pape deplores the fact that many Italians, forced by poverty to emigrate, find themselves in a worse position than ever in America. Great danger attends their souls, both during the voyage and on their arrival, owing to the difficulty of meeting priests speaking Italian. Peing much pre occupied with these facts the pope charged the Congregation de Propaganda Fide to study the two fold question of how to promote both the religious and the material welfare of emigrants, and it has been decided to despatch priests from Italy to the localities inhabited by the Italian emigrants." The pope declares that it will afford him great satisfaction if the American bisheps will facilitate the task of their priests by referring to the propaganda in regard to any changes required in their sacred duties. His holiness concludes with a benediction apon the bishops, clergy, and faithful in America.
