The Convicts Have a Jolly Spread at the Penitentiary-The Lunatics Treated in a Liberal Way-The Sick and Sad Made Happy in Various Other Churitable

Christmas, from a weather standpoint, was not as bright and cheery as in previous years. The softness which was presaged continued all yesterday, and a steady rain made it most disagreable for those who had any desire for an outing. The unsatisfactory state of things outside did not, however, prevent the citizens, with friends or relatives, from enjoying themselves. The inmates of the various public institutions had a happy time as our reports indicate.

Orphaus' Home.

The supply of Christmas gifts at the orphans' home was even more beautiful than usual. Numerous presents of fowls, fruits, &c., were sent in, and the Christmas tree on Christmas eve was heavily laden with the sort of fruits, most acceptable to children the Archduchess Valeria and Duke Francis at Christmas time. Beautifully dressed The institution was decorated with everdolls, toys of various kinds, candies, and greens, etc., the chapel being particularly more desirable gifts were displayed to the large eyes of the children, which were fixed on the tree in intense interest until the moment came for distribution. The friends who have so long kindly assisted in this pleasant work were there as usual, and a number of smiling little girls gladly aided in the pleasant task of filling the arms of the happy recipients. Short addresses were given by the Rev. Mears. Dobbs and Sparling. Appropriate hymns were sung by the children, and the procedings ended, usual, with "God Save the Queen," and hearty cheers from the children for the queen, the superintendents, and the kind friends who had given them the Christmas

It is worthy of note that in this somewhat unhealthy season there is not at present one sick in the orphans' home.

Kingston Penitentiary.

A penitentiary is not the place one would naturally choose to spend Christmas in, but being there it is not impossible to enjoy the day, and so our neighbors, the convicts, found out. Some days ago box after box began to arrive from thoughtful friends outside until nearly two hundred of them were presented to their owners. The way in which Christmas is celebrated here is mainly by a change in the bill of fare, and, of course, by services being held in both churches.

At breakfast the chief articles of food were hash, currant load, butter and coffee, with milk and sugar. At dinner eighteen hundred pounds of plum pudding were dished up after having been boiled all the previous night. Pork and beans and apples were also given them. The women also received, as a present from the warden, some turkeys and geese, which were decidedly

appreciated. Dr. Lavell, the warden, addressed both the men and the women, referring more particularly to the memories and associations of the day, and encouraging those whose hearts were at all heavy not to despair, but to aim for a higher and a nobler

His remarks were full of sympathy and cheer and deeply touched his hearers. Only seven men were in the hospital, and these were able to relish their Christmas dinner, Not one prisoner was under punishment for insubordination or disorder of any kind, and altogether Christmas passed comparatively pleasantly for most of the inhabitants of the provincial penitentiary.

General Hospital.

For several days active preparations have and cheering the patients with the thought that Christmas is again at hand. Under the supervision of Miss McMillan, the matron, the wards and halls of the hospital were fancifully decorated with stars, crosses, roses, flags and wreaths of evergreens, which gave the place a very attractive appearance. Everything indicated that great care had been bestowed upon the arrangements. Yesterday the usual Christmas dinner was given, which consisted of turkey, plumpudding, et cetera, and the patients fell to in earnest, utterly regardless of health and consequences, and in a manner that showed they considered that "Christmas comes but once a year." In the evening, with Dr. Hooper in the chair, an excellent programme was rendered, including a comic recitation by Mr. Raymond, which brought down the house again and again. Violin solos were turnished by Messrs, Little, McGrath, and a short address by Rev. Mr. McMorine, a frequent visitor of the hospital. The lead ing feature of the evening, however, was a speech by Charles Counter (Canada's own orator,) on the subject of "Woman's Rights, and with his usual proficiency did justice both to his subject and himself. A Christmas tree was placed in one of the wards and was thickly loaded with presents for most of the patients and others, and were distributed by Santa Clause after a short interesting speech. About half-past nine the pro gramme was concluded, and all expressed themselves as thoroughly satisfied with the

For the celebration of the masses the chapel was tastefully and appropriately decurated, while the other parts of the house presented a very charming appearance. The best things of the season were abundantly supplied by kind friends and patrons who, on this glad festival each year, generously add to the happiness of the inmates. Al fully enjoyed the luxuries thus provided. The day's enjoyment was greatly increased by pleasant visits of thoughtful friends who felt richly rewarded on hearing from the lips of the aged and orphan numberless blessings invoked and gratitude expressed. The proceedings of this very happy day were closed by the benediction of the blessed sacrament by Rev. J. S. Quinn, chaplain of the institution.

A CRUEL AND BRUTAL PAIR.

A Stupid Dentist And a Cruel Husband

> teeth extracted. Mrs. Scelwig was of a nervous temperament and hesitated. Her husband became angry and declared that he would leave the house if she did not stop complaining. The wife then determined to go to the dentist's, and the husband was induced to go with her. At the dentist's the woman almost fainted from nervousness. This had the effect of making the husband quite irascible, but with the assistance of the dentist, she was placed in the chair and the man with his forceps commenced the work of extraction. Mrs. Scelwig could not take an anæsthetic, and when two or three of her teeth had been taken out she pulled violently to escape the dentist's operation. It was necessary to have thirteen teeth removed, and the husband determined not to permit his wife to leave the chair until every one had been taken out. To make the work easier for the dentist the husband held his wife's head and arms so that she could not move, and the work continued until all the teeth had been extracted. By this time the woman was exhausted and unable to rise from the chair. The two men realized that she was in a dangerous condition, and at once applied restoratives. A physician was summoned and every effort made to revive the woman, but it was of no avail. She died two hours later.
