The execution was witnessed by 200 artists, newspaper men, actors, lawyers and politicians. Prado died with much the same bravado as M. Pranzini, his former chum and counterpart. I'en thousand people surrounded the prisons but there was no disorder.

The rabble spent the night in singing comic songs, and amusng themselves in other boisterous ways. Prado protested his innecence of the murder to the last, and declared against the injustice of the world. He refused to disclose his real name. When the jailors came to pinion his limbs he offered no resistance, and while they were engaged in this operation he shed one tear. The sight of the guillotine appeared to hypnotize him.

CABINET MAKING GOING ON.

Wire-Pullers at Work on Gen. Harrison-Basis of Settlement.

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 28. - The Times' Washington says the efforts of the New York senators and representatives to effect a compromise between the factions involved in the cabinet embroglio in the empire state have at last reached a means of settlement, which practically puts an end to any further obstructions in the way of cabinet making in that direction. It is said to have been settled on the basis of Warner Miller for the secretaryship of interior, and Thomas C. Platt for collector of the port of New York. With the settlement of New York troubles come a somewhat authoritative statement that Governor Proctor and John C. New have been stated for cabinet places. Mr. New's appointment has been favorably spoken of to the president by several distinguished senators.
