The Puritans of New England, although themselves the exiles of persecution, did not scruple to punish the Quakers and other "dissenters" from them in matters of faith. small illustration of this spirit of intolerant reprisal is to hand in an incident of the recent troubles in Montreal. A Mr. Force, who happens to be a large employer of labour there, declared that he had been opposed to the proposed Orange procession on the 12th, and had threatened to discharge any man who dared to join it against his order. Now, however, after the events of last week, he will, he says, next 12th discharge any man who refuses to turn out in the Orange procession. Mr. Force might have meant well, and there may be good deal of force, both in his name and nature, but these are the very essentials of despotism in the arbitary determination to which he gives expression. To discharge a man for joining an Orange or any other procession, would be bad enough; tho' for such a step there would be some excuse and precedent, but to cashier him for not joining it, would seem to be a still more intolerant stretch of an employer's legitimate authority. There are two effective modes of securing civil Lucrty. One of these the Orangemen put into practical form recently at the funeral; the other is by refraining from retaliation. Two or any number of wrongs, will, in no case, make a right. A concession of liberty is the only basis on which to rest one's own inallenable claim to it.
