London, Aug. 9.-Two minor engage ments in Bulgaria are reported this mornin, in the one of which five thousand were defeated by the Russians, who cocupy an entrenched position near Plevna. The Russians did pot, however, follow up their advantage, as the Grand Duke Nicholas was unwilling to waste the energy of his troops on a partial engagement, which took place at Jaslar, south of Rasgrad, two regiments of Russian cavalry and one battalion of infantry were routed after a bloody struggle. The Russian troops around Plevna have been reinforced, and now number seventy thousand. The Roumanian army, 25, 000 strong, which is now continually crossing the Danube at Nikopoli, will form the right wing of this corps.
