A long time previous to the period alluded to some disagreement in family matters had rendered his puptial relationship a source of dissatisfaction and Franco German war he sailed for his native country and enlisted in the French army. The sail reverses in his country, tacks of epilepsy, which were very frequent and severe at the beginning, but which latterly have been only monthly, for him in his own house, his relatives hastily sent him to Beauport Asylum where he remained one month. After this, a place was provided for him in the Longue Point Asylum. His wife was s widow before his marriage with her, and was the mother of a daughter, who has since been married. Mr. Pavie has more than once wished to make his will in favor of this daughter, but now appear facts which may cast some light on the releutless manner in which he has been imprisoned. His wife had caused him to be interdicted, and had secured for herself the complete control of his estate, Pavie's visits to her husband during his imprisonment were never oftener than once a month, and then not of the most pleasing nature. Another fact probably connected with his treatment is that he i obliged to pay the many twenty-five (25) per month for his board. The result o the legal proceedings will be looked for ward to with interest.
