DEFENCE OR THE UNITED STATES FRONTIER. - The Chicago Tribune says: Several of the posts of the Grand Army of the Republic have drawn up a series of resolutions embodying a plan for froutier protection. The object is to guard the frontier by a cordon of posts, garrisoned by veterans of the late war oc cupying the country as actual colonists. The Government is to give each actual settler who served in the late war 160 acres of the public lands, furnish a saw mill and grist mill for each district, and also establish a quartermaster's department for the purpose of issuing lumber and material to build houses, and furnish grain and vegetables for planting, with farming utensils and one horse and cow to each man. The colonies are to consist of 1,000 men to each district, divided into companies of 100 men each, who will choose their own officers, receive arms and ammunition, transporation and subsistence in time of war, and pay for three years, at the end of which time a perfect title shall be given to all real and personal property issued to each settler. The bill is now in the hands of Secretary Schurz for examination, and will be brought up in Congress at the next ses-A somewhat similar plan for the defence of the colonies is proposed by the Army and Navy Gazette, which suggests that officers and soldiers discharged from the English army should be provided for by land grants, upon conditions much the same as above. 
