# CONVICT LABOR.

Letter From the Warden. To the Editor of the British Whia.

SIR. - In reply to a communication signed 'Contractor,' published in last the employment of three Penitentiary convicts in the erection of a small frame building on one of the lots lately sold by Mr. Morrison, does not interfere with any work in which private citizens or contractors are interested.

As 'Contractor' says this matter has been a subject of discussion amongst a number of mechanics and others, I will give you all the facts connected with it, and I think 'Contractor' and his friends will admit that, without injuring any public or private interest, I have been belping a poor but deserving mechanic-

Officers of the Penitentiary are allowed two weeks holidays during the year. Keeper Davidson, who is a practical carpenter, and has charge of the Carpenter Shop in the Penitentiary, and who has been a faithful and useful officer of the institution for nearly twenty years, came to me about five weeks ago and said that I was aware there were a good many days owing to him ; that if I would give him three or four we ks of these, and the labor of two or three convicts, for which he would pay, that with the assistance of a friend he would buy a lot in the neighborhood of the prison and build a small some time ago, assented to the principle of furnishing convict labor to assist in building dwelling houses for officers in immediate proximity to the prison, complied with keeper Davidson's request. If I had not done so, no lot would have been purchased or house built, hence no "Contractor" or private citizen has suf-

fered by my action in this matter. 'Contractor' says he is informed that there is "a good deal of work done in the Prison, such as cutting stone, making "sash and other things of this sort for 'particular frienda." Now, sir, as quarrying, dressing and breaking stone is the only employment we have for more than half the convicts in the Prison, I have never hesitated to sell stone to any who applied for it. Contractors in Kingston seldom patronize us, as I have been inset stone bought here. But as to "sash "and other things of this sort" there is none made in the Penitentiary for outsiders that I am aware of. I think I know to what 'Contractor' refers. If my surmise is correct he will find that the sash to which he alludes was made at Mr.f Waddingham's factory in Kingston. The insinuation that favors are granted to particular friends' is base and groundess. 'Contractor' says I once publicly avowed myself to be a mechanic. That is quite true, and I have always felt proud of the Printer's Craft to which I belong, and the Craft has no reason to be


