Russians Preparing for it Winter Campaign.

As was surmised, the reported defeat of the Russians by Osman Pashs on Saturday was a mistake, the defeat reserved to in the original despatch having been that inflicted on Gen. Skubeleff on Wednesday. Since that day there has been no serious fighting in this neighborhood. The report that the Turks were repulsed in seven attacks on the Grivica redoubt also turns out to have been a myth. The Russian attack on Pievna, upon the whole, appears to have failed beyond the possibility of retrieval, at all events not this season, and their forces in southern and eastern Bulgaria are now serionely threatened. Iu the Shipka Pass the great Russian stronghold, Fort St. Nicholae, has been captured, and it is reported, from a Russian as well as from Turkish source, that Suleiman Pashs and Mehemet Ali have effected a junction and are meditating combined attack upon the Czarevitch. Even with reinforcements the latter will have a hard time of it, as he has hitherto been unable to cope with Mehemet All alone, and has satisfied himself with a series of retreats, from the Ak Lom to the Kara Lom, and from the Kara Lom to the Jantra. His policy throughout appears to have been one of inactivity, though hardly of masterly inactivity, as he has not saved himself from one or two ugly rubs, for which he has nothing to show to the credit side. The Russian are still unwilling to give up the game, and are preparing for a winter campaign, Gen. Todleben, the defender of Sebastopol, having received orders to prepare for the fortification of winter camps at Matchin, Hirsova, Sistova and Nikopoli.
