Mr. W. W. Ogilvie, of the firm of A W. Ogilvie & Co., Montreal, who has just returned from Manitoba, exhibited samples of the wheat produced there. which is principally of two kinds-what is known as the Manitobs wheat proper, and the Russian wheat, or that which is raised by the Mennonites. The Manitoba wheat is a strong dark flinty wheat, the purpose of making the new process patent floor; while the Russian wheat is ! also a strong dack wheat, but not so large in the berry. A sample in the straw showed a large yield, the straw itself being often over five feet in height. The average yield of wheat per acre this year will be from thirty to thirty live bushels, and it would have been much better but for the unusually wet weather in the early part of the year, which caused the plant to run too much to straw. EMIGRATION TO THE UNITED STATES. Sir John Macdonald has been saving that 400,000 French Canadians alone have been forced to emigrate to the United States because of the policy of the present Government. The Hamilton Zrenny Times has caught him very nicely this time. It quotes an official report, made by the Rev. P. E. Gendreau in 1873 to the then Minister of Agricultura, the Cresswell, at the Paramatta Asylum, to Hon. J. H.
