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THE WAR NEWS.

Loss to the Turkish Army.

As further intelligence is received from the seat of war in Asia the defeat of Mukhtar Pasha's army proves to have been more complete than has been supposed.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 19.—An Igdyr despatch of Oct. 17th says: On receiving information of the defeat, Imam Pasha withdrew from the neighbourhood of Igdyr to the heights of Zor, near the Frontier of Beleran.
