The Watertown Times prints an historic piece, emanating from Clayton. One f the chains in Capt. G. S. Johnson's shippard there, used for pulling vessels out of water, has an interesting history. It was made in England in 1806. The links are one foot long, and made from 12 inch wire. The chain in 1812 was Cedari at Kingston, to prevent the enemy's vessels from coming into port. Mr. Walkem asked, but did not learn definitely, what was the Engineer's teuure of office, and whether the words of the report would bar him from compensation upon dismissal.

Ald. Allen argued that the cost of numbers should be taken out of the general sasessment, the same as the street corner signs. The charge of ten cents was small enough, but this would be a constant trouble to collect it. As to the Engineer, it was very hard to dismiss at this season, when the work was nearly all done. People complained of not finding the Engineer in his office always, but how could be be in his office and overlooking the work in seven wards, scattered over miles. An assistant was required in the city's best interests, and when he was qualified the Council would be in a position to dispense with the Engineer if he did not do his duty.
