BEACONSFIELD ON THE WAR. The full text of Lord Beaconsfield's speech at the Lord Mayor's banquet is to hand, and from it we learn that famine and war, two sufficiently uninviting themes, constituted the dual burden of the address. He referred at some length to the appalling dearth in India, and, in highly congratulatory terms, to the efforts of the Vicerov to alleviale the distress, and to the munificent charity of Greet Britain to her distant dependency. But the matter of the Indian famine was only prefatory to the British Premier's deliverance on that subject of much nearer and more absorbing interest -- the Eastern war, and the probabilities of its termination. This subject Lord Beaconstield treated from a Ministerial, in fact, from s party standpoint. With a few offsetting compliments to the Russian Czar aud soldiery, but not to the Russian cause, the Premier's speech, as between the hostiles themselves, was exceedingly pro-Turkish, and as between the domesti political parties, it was, as might have been expected, severely and sarcastically anti-Liberal, in other words, a vindication of himself and Government, de nouncing his denouncers as "men who were the friends of every country save their own." He admitted the salfishness of the governmental policy, but claimed that it was the selfishness of patriotism. This policy is claimed to have secured both the national dignity and the public tranquility. Lord Beaconsfield defends the neutrality of Great Pritain, as compared with the Crimean war policy, on the score of the ability of the Turkish nation, without ontside assistance to defend itself against Russian aggression, and claims that British menerality has even been a benefit to Turkey, as enabling the Turkish nation to convince not only other nations but itself as well, that there was far more capacity for selfdefence in the Mosler: Empire than was popularly supposed. Of course it was very fortunate for the Distaelian policy that Turkey has been able to develope and illustrate to such a marked degree noble act of self-defence. 
