DISINTERESTED.

The Metropolitan Tory organ has been very eulogistic lately of the Hon. Mr. Blake as a prospective judge. Reminiscences of an Octogenarian.

De omnibus rebus et quibusdem aliis Kingston, December 1st, 1877. This day I have been forty-five years a Canada. I landed in Kingston from Oswego on the first day of December, 1832; at which I have remained ever since.
