# THE WAR NEWS.

Further Turkish Successes.

London, Dec. 7 .- Notwithstanding the recent capture of Elena by Suleiman Pasha, which is admitted by the Russians, the Turks are reported to despair of further success, and it is stated, on the authority of a letter purporting to be from the Turkish official in a high position of trust, that the Turks will treat seperately with Russia for peace, granting the free passage of the Bosphorous, as soon as Erzeroum has fallen and Adrianople is threatened. A minor success on the Kara Lom is announced, the Turks having crossed the river and taken Papaskoi. There is no further news from Suleiman Pasha, but a detachment of his troops is said to be within three hours' murch of
