NEW WESTMINISTER-

The Globe of to-day editorially remarks that among the members of the House of Commons who, it was alleged, had contravened the provisions of the Independence of Parliament Act, as interpreted by the Committee on Privileges and Elections, was Mr. James Cunningham, the member for New Westminister, British Columbia. The Act of last session relieved all such parties of the pecuniary penalties to which up to the time of its passing they had become liable, but it did not touch in bthe least the question of their right to sit and vote, supposing that by having had any commercial transactions with the Goverument their seats had been vacate. Consequently all such persons would be placing themselves at the mercy of whoever might sue for penalties if they again appeared in their places at Ottawa. Mr. Cunningham had, it appears, as a merchant, supplied some goods to agents of the Government, in total ignorance that he was thereby affecting his status as member of Parliament. And in order to avoid any difficulty he has resigned his seat and offered himself for re-election.

PRETENTIOUS.

Count Andrassy, the Austrian Premier, has been indulging in some rather loud protestations on behalf of the country over whose destinies he has the honour to preside. He says the factor o force must be considered in the relations between European Powers as the only element that can make treaties valid. He then grandtlequently announces that Austria is the Arbiter of her own destinice; that no European state oun more reliably count on obtaining the recognition of its just demands; he repudi ates the imputation that Austria is acting under the influence of Germany, and finally declares that no Power in Europe can undertake the settlement of the Eastern Question without the co-operation of Austria.
